My name is Laura Lee, and I am from Madison, Wisconsin. I am a veterinarian working in anatomic pathology. I am writing to ask you to include veterinarian health care professionals in Phase 1b of the Wisconsin COVID-19 vaccination plan.

As a veterinarian, we work with animals that can contract and transmit the SARS-CoV-2 virus. As an anatomic pathologist, performing postmortem examinations (autopsies) on animals is one of my primary job responsibilities. If I were to perform an autopsy on a SARS-CoV-2 positive animal, it would put my coworkers and me at a high risk of contracting the virus. Already we have had cases in which SARS-CoV-2 was considered a differential diagnosis only after the autopsy had been started. Due to the nature of my work, I cannot work remotely or from home. Further, although I do not have the job title of educator, I (as well as many other veterinarians) work closely with university students who have historically been among the biggest spreaders of the virus in Wisconsin. If I were to contract SARS-CoV-2 and transmit it to a student, the chances of it spreading in the population increases.

Dear Subcommittee Members,

I am writing to urge that you consider the allocation of vaccines for the staff of veterinary clinics in Phase 1b of the Covid-19 vaccination phases.

As the pandemic and frequent lockdowns have continued, the rate of pet adoption has spiked enormously. In my own experience, connected with shelters in my area, I have seen massive turnover rates and sometimes entire shelters being cleared out. The pet care industry has seen a large growth with the pandemic, a trend that was already picking up speed, and though pet health care may be de-prioritized officially, nationally it is clearly a high priority for Americans. The significance of a pet in one's life also cannot be ignored and the significance of a sick pet on one's mental health is also key.

All of this being said, I was dismayed to not see veterinary staff included in the list of essential workers. We are exposed to many different people every day and many different pets and the numbers are only growing. We also cannot be distanced from our fellow employees as most procedures require two people working in tandem (and sometimes more) in order to restrain the pet and do whatever task is required. As a vet assistant at Banfield Pet Hospital on the west side of Madison, we are also subjected to the particles generated by the people who enter the Petsmart that we are connected to. Additionally, our clinic is quite small which is, in my experience, fairly common for veterinary clinics and makes distancing truly impossible. In conclusion, I ask that you please cover our pet healthcare workers as part of this first phase, as the health of our four-legged family members is clearly a matter of utmost importance to all of us and though risk can be mitigated with veterinary clinics, it is still far too high. As I stated above, Americans deeply care about their animals and their mental health suffers when they are sick, but also vet clinic staff cannot possibly stay distant, and we also are exposed to a high volume of people and pets which increases our personal exposure risk. I hope you will consider my argument, thank you for your time.





I am a co-owner of Four Paws Veterinary Clinic in Sauk City. I am writing to request that veterinary staff be included in group 1B of essential workers. There has been no clear guidance on this but the need to include veterinary staff in group 1B is clear.

- 1. Veterinarians provide essential services and have continued to do so throughout the pandemic. Many veterinarians assure the safety of our food supply, and small animal veterinarians provide essential services for pets such as rabies vaccines, emergency surgery, and much more.
- 2. Pets have become even more important for people's health and well-being throughout the pandemic. Pets promote exercise, mental health, and provide emotional support. We have seen a huge increase in pet ownership in the last year.
- 3. Veterinarians and support staff are at risk from the public and potentially animals. There is some indication that domestic cats and dogs can harbor the virus, and could pose a risk if their owners are infected. Pet ferrets pose a risk. In addition, during an emergency or euthanasia people are under emotional stress and don't always wear masks or socially distance from staff caring for their pet. Veterinarians have continued to provide vital emergency and euthanasia services throughout the pandemic.
- 4. Veterinarians and staff are trusted members of the health care community and are uniquely able to educate clients and promote vaccine acceptance. Staff will be much more able to do this if they, themselves, are vaccinated.

My name is Dr. Douglas Kratt, and I am from La Crosse, Wisconsin. I am a veterinarian and a small business owner. I am writing to ask you to include veterinarian health care professionals in Phase 1b of the Wisconsin COVID-19 vaccination plan.

I presently serve as the President of the AVMA and have served as the President of the Wisconsin VMA. Early on, veterinarians were determined to be essential health care workers due to our work in the food supply, public health, and food safety. The AVMA has advocated successfully at the federal level for veterinary personnel to be considered a priority group for vaccination. Based on the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), it appears that much veterinary personnel could be accommodated in Phase 1-b of the CDC's recommended three-phase plan.

Vaccination is critical in the fight against COVID-19. As veterinary teams continue to provide needed healthcare services for our patients, all team members need to get vaccinated as early as possible. Vaccination is the best way for us to protect human health – of both team members and clients – as we continue to see patients and work within our communities.

We are a primary care facility for companion animals with no local access to emergency care. Because of the pandemic, there have been delays in routine care for all animals in our care, prioritizing the most critical. Although we still are working with clients on preventive care via numerous methods, we are also tasked with assisting with the control of various zoonotic diseases. Of addition note, we provide care for many K9 officers, including the Wisconsin State Patrol, La Crosse County, Cities of Onalaska and Tomah, Village of Holmen, and Town of Campbell.

I understand your task is monumental, but I respectfully request that veterinary teams are placed in Phase 1-b.

Dear Secretary-Designee Palm and Members of the SDMAC Vaccine Distribution Subcommittee:

I am writing today to respectfully urge you to include veterinarians, veterinary technicians, veterinary assistants, and other veterinary clinic staff in the Phase 1b prioritization list for COVID-19 vaccine distribution.

Veterinary health care workers are essential frontline workers who provide critical care to both food/fiber animals and companion animals throughout the State of Wisconsin. We have been on the frontlines, saving animal lives through this entire pandemic.

The closure of veterinary clinics and facilities due to COVID-19 outbreaks among veterinary staff poses a unique risk to the continuity of animal care. In many areas of the state, there is limited availability of veterinary care. As a result, if a clinic or practice is forced to close due to COVID-19 exposure, there may not be any geographically accessible alternative for patients.

In addition, veterinary health care workers cannot work remotely or work from home. Currently, the provision of veterinary care via telehealth is not allowed under Wisconsin law. As a result, the provision of patient care requires uninterrupted in-person provision and availability of health care services.

I have worked throughout the entire pandemic as an emergency surgical technician in a large animal hospital. I have seen how COVID-19 has brought fatigue on everyone I work with due to staff shortages from individuals needing to quarantine or stay home sick. We are exhausted and if we do not receive the much needed vaccinations soon, I am afraid more emergency clinics will be shut down, causing more unnecessary loss of animal lives. I have been on the frontlines throughout the entire pandemic and I have not had the luxury of staying home.

As such, I respectfully urge you to include Wisconsin veterinary workers in Phase 1b.

Dear Secretary-Designee Palm and Members of the SDMAC Vaccine Distribution Subcommittee:

My name is Jordan Genovese and I am from Madison, Wisconsin. I am a veterinary student at UW-Madison's School of Veterinary Medicine. I am writing to ask you to include veterinarian health care professionals in Phase 1b of the Wisconsin COVID-19 vaccination plan.

When I am not in school, I work as a technician at a walk-in clinic that serves upwards of 80 pet owners, a large population of whom are low-income, per day. Since we are a walk-in clinic, over the course of the pandemic, we have absorbed hundreds of clients who are otherwise unable to make appointments at their family veterinarian for both routine and emergency procedures due to staffing constraints and COVID-19-related pressures.

The need for veterinary care has not disappeared. Folks are lining up on multiple-month wait lists to get their pets the most basic, routine care. In fact, the demand has *increased* during the pandemic due to the amount of families who have welcomed new pets into their homes over the last 10 months. Veterinary clinics across Wisconsin are at capacity and running on fumes—I speak from experience. Whether it is a pet emergency or a simple, "it's just a Rabies vaccine, Fido needs it as it required by law," these requests, either big or small, add up to many additional hours of work each day. This, coupled with a thin staff due to quarantines or infections, veterinary health workers are burning out. However, improving these conditions is something within your power.

Adding veterinary professionals to 1b would not place an undue burden on the general demand for vaccine compared to the supply (~2,400 vaccine series, if every Wisconsin veterinary health worker were to sign up). There are many in this field (I'm sure you are hearing from them) that would get the vaccine today if they could. It's also my understanding that there will be incentives to states that administer more vaccines (i.e., they will receive even more doses). If you know you have a guaranteed population of individuals who will get this vaccine, why not open the door for them to do so?

That said, perhaps most importantly, veterinary professionals possess the instrumental skills needed to administer vaccinations. Vaccinating veterinarians will increase the amount of individuals able to physically administer vaccines to the public—only further increasing the capacity to deliver this public health intervention Wisconsin, and the country, so desperately requires.
