Dear Secretary-Designee Palm and Members of the SDMAC Vaccine Distribution Subcommittee:

My name is Dr. Emma Svenson, and I am from Madison, Wisconsin. I am a PhD student in epidemiology at the University of Wisconsin-Madison's Department of Population Health Sciences, and a practicing veterinarian, pursuing a laboratory animal medicine residency at the Wisconsin National Primate Research Center. I am writing to respectfully request that veterinary health care professionals, including veterinarians, veterinary technicians, and veterinary assistants, be recognized for their critical, public-facing work in maintaining both animal and human health throughout this pandemic. Veterinary professionals should be included as a priority recipient group for vaccination during Phase 1B of COVID-19 vaccination.

Veterinarians and veterinary staff provide crucial preventive care and emergency care to diverse animal populations, including domestic companion animals, livestock species, laboratory animals, and both captive and free-ranging wildlife species. These activities can contribute directly to supporting food and agriculture industries, considered essential critical infrastructure. Maintaining access to high-quality food that safe for consumption is an important aspect of human health. Furthermore, many can recognize the important role pets can play in supporting mental and physical wellbeing, especially during the pandemic. Pets are a source of emotional and social support an era of increasing self-isolation and social distancing, and may inspire owners to maintain levels of physical activity that they would not otherwise achieve. Veterinarians are crucial to promoting companion animal health and welfare, indirectly impacting the health of companion animal owners. Additionally, veterinarians safeguard human public health through surveillance for zoonotic diseases, such as rabies, influenza, and COVID-19, among others. Those involved in laboratory animal care directly support research efforts to understand and combat COVID-19, and may work with animals experimentally infected with COVID-19. Veterinarians are thus actively involved in 1) maintaining food security, 2) maintaining companion animal welfare, thereby fostering the human-animal bond and promoting mental and physical health 3) zoonotic disease recognition and prevention, and 4) research efforts to combat the COVID-19 pandemic. Based on these activities, veterinary health care workers are essential frontline healthcare workers, and the cessation of veterinary activities due to COVID-19 outbreaks among veterinary staff poses a unique risk for both animal and human health.

As health care professionals, we recognize that vaccination is only one aspect of safeguarding health and preventing COVID-19 transmission among our staff. Social distancing in the workplace, adequate personal protective equipment, the use of telemedicine whenever

possible, and other risk management strategies are all necessary to control COVID-19. However, veterinarians and veterinary staff encounter situations in which adequate physical distancing from each other or from the public is impossible on a daily basis, both when handling animals and performing medical procedures. As just one example, most small animal clinics still allow pet owners to be physically present in exam rooms during euthanasia appointments. Families frequently hold animals as euthanasia is being performed, and prefer to talk to veterinarians face-to-face regarding this difficult decision. Regular close contact to other people presents an obvious risk for COVID-19 transmission. We also know that COVID-19 appears to affect animals, with natural infection occurring in dogs, cats, minks, tigers, lions and great apes, and experimentally induced infection occurring in ferrets, bats, hamsters and macaques in laboratory settings. This may pose a risk for zoonotic disease transmission to veterinary professionals in close contact with infected animals, especially in a laboratory setting. There is also potential that as the COVID-19 virus naturally mutates and changes over time, a new strain may spillover from animals to people a second time. Having an inoculated workforce working closely with animals may therefore be an important upstream preventive measure, and early vaccination will help mitigate some of the risks related to direct contact with both people and animals.

Finally, veterinarians are highly trusted healthcare professionals within our communities. We are currently experiencing a high degree of vaccine skepticism and hesitancy in this country, and unfortunately in this state. Veterinary professionals can be a part of promoting confidence in vaccination, and share messaging regarding the importance of vaccination as part of a common public health mission. Similar to human healthcare professionals, this messaging is most trusted and effectively conveyed by people who have themselves received a vaccine.

Thank you for allowing community members the opportunity to provide feedback on draft recommendations for Wisconsin's Phase 1B COVID-19 vaccine distribution priority, and for your consideration of this request.

Dear Secretary-Designee Palm and members of the SDMAC Vaccine Distribution Subcommittee:

On behalf of the veterinarians in the State of Wisconsin, I write to respectfully urge you to include veterinarians, veterinary technicians, veterinary assistants, and other veterinary clinic staff in the Phase 1b prioritization list for COVID-19 vaccine distribution.

Veterinary health care workers are essential frontline workers who provide critical care to both food/fiber animals and companion animals throughout the State of Wisconsin.

The closure of veterinary clinics and facilities due to COVID-19 outbreaks among veterinary staff poses a unique risk to the continuity of animal care. In many areas of the state, there is limited availability of veterinary care. As a result, if a clinic or practice is forced to close due to COVID-19 exposure, there may not be any geographically accessible alternative for patients.

In addition, veterinary health care workers cannot work remotely or work from home. Currently, the provision of veterinary care via telehealth is not allowed under Wisconsin law. As a result, the provision of patient care requires uninterrupted in-person provision and availability of health care services.

Veterinarians also actively participate in protecting public and animal health through surveillance for the SARS-CoV-2 virus in non-human animals. Our surveillance function extends well beyond SARS-CoV-2, encompassing many other potentially zoonotic diseases.

As such, we are very disappointed to see our veterinary professionals overlooked in this recommendation for the next phase of vaccine distribution. We respectfully urge you to include Wisconsin veterinary workers in Phase 1b.

My name is Dr. Seth Oberschlake and I am from Appleton, Wisconsin. I am a Veterinarian and Veterinary Hospital Owner. I am writing to ask you to include veterinary health care professionals in Phase 1b of the Wisconsin COVID-19 vaccination plan.

From the beginning of this pandemic we as a profession have continued to work tirelessly to care for our animal companions and help the owners that they belong to. Unlike a lot of professions, even essential professions, veterinarians and our employees are unable to work remotely and have sacrificed daily to do our jobs. With so many people staying at home and working from home, there has been such an increased work load and need for veterinary care. We are typically unable to stay socially distanced from each other in our profession, have often been put on the bottom of PPE priority, and therefore are at high risk of getting an spreading covid.

Even though we do everything in our power to be safe, we and other veterinary practices, have had numerous covid outbreaks through our clinics putting our lives at risk, our families/friends lives at risk, and the animals we cannot see because of this, at risk.

Numerous clinics throughout our area and the state are in a similar place. For months we are often extremely short staffed all the time, have had to even close our practices due to quarantines, exposures, and infections. Many of my staff are high risk and have family members that are high risk.

One Health is the collaboration between human and animal health as they are often intertwined. Veterinarians and veterinary teams contribute directly to the food and agriculture industries, helping them continue to run smoothly and safely. In addition to providing critical support for the sufficiency and safety of our nation's food supply, veterinarians also help ensure the health and wellbeing of the pets that share our homes. Those pets have played an important role in supporting their owners' physical and mental wellbeing during the pandemic. There is still so much we don't know about covid and the roll animals play in it's incubation, transmission, and mutations.

It's disappointing to hear veterinarians and our staff continue to be disregarded in our value to society. Being placed behind prisoner's is particularly upsetting. We would be happy to help with administoring vaccinations if that would help speed processes of getting these into people's arms that need it and want it. We would be much for qualified to vaccinate then some of the other professions that have been suggested to give them.

My name is Lisa Schultz and I am from New Berlin, Wisconsin. I am a veterinarian practicing in the city of Brookfield, WI. I am writing to ask you to include veterinarian health care professionals in Phase 1b of the Wisconsin COVID-19 vaccination plan.

I understand that our patients are not humans. But they come attached to humans. We're doing curbside service, but not everyone has a cell phone, so were often out in the parking lot talking to owners, many of whom are not wearing masks. We're also letting clients in the building if they make the difficult decision to euthanize their pet. This is a time when people are wailing and sobbing and aerosolizing respiratory viruses, and almost always do not follow our request for them to keep a mask on.

I would also like to point out that at the beginning of the pandemic, we respected requests to cancel all elective appointments and procedures/surgery to save supplies for human use. We're healthcare workers when it comes to re-using our surgical masks and face shields for 10 months to conserve PPE.

There have been a number of local clinics in my area, including one of the large referral/ER centers that have had to temporarily close due to so many staff being infected with COVID that they were unable to keep their doors open. We need to stay healthy to be able to provide the healthcare that our patients desperately need.

In addition, veterinary patients ARE susceptible to COVID-19. While uncommon, there are scattered reports of dogs and cats being infected COVID.

Dear Secretary-Designee Palm and Members of the SDMAC Vaccine Distribution Subcommittee,

My name is Dr Alexander Saver and I am from Madison, Wisconsin. I am a veterinarian and university educator at the University of Wisconsin-Madison's School of Veterinary Medicine. I am writing to ask you to include veterinary health care professionals in Phase 1b of the Wisconsin COVID-19 vaccination plan. In my day to day work, I have broad exposure to members of the public, rotating fourth year veterinary students, and hundreds of our hospital employees. Given the nature of my work and the small confines of the hospital, we are not able to adequately protect ourselves from COVID-19 infection by social distancing or staying at home. While we have been able to mitigate some risks by means of curbside service, mask wearing, limited social distancing and hand washing, everyday we are still exposed intimately to members of the public and have been since March 2020. We have done this with the purpose of providing essential care to companion animals and their families. Every working day since March, I have had small, yet nerve wracking interactions with hundreds of Wisconsinites. I have no idea of their infection status, including whether I am speaking to someone who may be asymptomatically infected or infected and concealing their disease status. Of particular concern, on a daily basis, myself, veterinarians and veterinary support staff all over the state compromise our own personal safety by waiving curbside restrictions and allowing families to be with critically ill and dying pets at the end of their lives. In my own personal experience, I have been put in high risk situations where I am in close contact (often a mere foot or two) with often incredibly emotional and inconsistently masked members of public as I euthanize their pets. I have sacrificed by own personal safety to allow families to be with their pets as they pass as they go through times of incredible heartache. Moreover, as veterinary health care professionals, we have done this throughout the pandemic without proper PPE (such as N95 masks or gowns) in order to preserve resources for our human health care counterparts. I hope that you will consider including veterinary health care professionals in Phase 1b of Wisconsin's vaccine rollout as veterinarians are crucial in the care for food-producing and companion animals, and fill an essential role that society is unable to function without. While people may refute this notion, I would ask you to reflect about your own pets, and what you would do if your veterinarian was not able-bodied in their time of need.



RE: Veterinarians - Phase 1b COVID Vaccination Plan

Dear Secretary-Designee Palm and Members of the SDMAC Vaccine Distribution Subcommittee:

My name is Dr. Douglas DeBoer and I am from Oregon, Wisconsin. I am a practicing veterinarian and a senior faculty member at the UW-Madison School of Veterinary Medicine. As an educator with extensive student contact, I am already included in Phase 1b as you have outlined it. I am writing to ask you to consider also including all veterinary health care professionals in Phase 1b of the Wisconsin COVID-19 vaccination plan.

In our University multispecialty and primary-care practice, as with all veterinary practices in the state, we have seen a dramatic upsurge in demand for veterinary patient care. Our departments currently see nearly 30,000 patient visits annually, from essentially every county in the state or Wisconsin, as well as all neighboring states. This upsurge in demand for veterinary care is well-recognized globally, as pet ownership during the pandemic has soared and companion animals have assumed an ever-greater role in mitigating our society's emotional and psychosocial distress - and mental health challenges experienced by millions of Wisconsin residents.



We are living on the knife edge between demand and supply, and already often failing. We cannot afford to have any more staff or doctor shortages. A COVID outbreak in our practice would be disastrous for our patient population, and on the human population that relies on us for their care.

It strikes me that increasion or annual health care staff in Phase 1b adds an inconsequential number of eligible individuals – only a few thousand, representing perhaps a 0.5% increase in the group that the Subcommittee has already recommended for Phase 1b. This tiny increase, though, would represent an enormous safety net for the pet-owning public.

It is also wise to realize that veterinary professionals represent an important pool of medically-trained individuals, already skilled and experienced in preparation and administration of vaccines, in health records, and in medical observation. Going forward, this group potentially could be called upon to provide assistance in future mass COVID vaccination campaigns. Were this group also already vaccinated, such assistance could be rendered with immediacy.

Good Day,

As an essential member of the Henry Vilas Zoo Animal care team, I respectfully request that all animal care staff at Henry Vilas Zoo be considered as 1B tier vaccination candidates, under the same qualifications as MINK HUSBANDRY.

Daily, at the zoo, we care for exotic animals that are susceptible to the SARS-Cov-2 virus. The following animals are in our care and are documented and known to be susceptible.

- Felids Tigers and Lions (Several zoos across the USA have had large cats test positive, Tigers, Snow Leopards etc.)
- Non-Human Primates Orangutans (Gorillas at San Diego Safari park recently tested positive)
- Mustelids (same family as Mink) Ferrets, North American Badgers, North American Otters
- Skunks (related to mustelids)
- Additionally, we manage onsite pest control of animals such as mink and raccoons and sometimes these wild native pest animals are caught and eaten by species such as Tiger, Lions, Bears and Orangutans.

It has been documented that transmission of the virus to some of these animals has come from covid positive, asymptomatic animal care staff. We do not want this to occur at Henry Vilas Zoo. It is also **not** known yet, if any other species that contracts the virus, other than mink, will mutate the virus, which could be possible.

We want to continue to do everything we can to keep ourselves healthy in order to continue the essential and daily care for the beloved animals of Henry Vilas Zoo, and to ensure we do not inadvertently pass on this deadly virus to any of our susceptible animals. We also do not want to become a vector for any virus mutation that may occur. Allowing us to become eligible in group 1B for the vaccine is paramount to ensure safety for the animals and animal care staff at HVZ.

Dear Secretary-Designee Adrea Palm and SDMAC Vaccine Distribution Subcommittee:

I am incredibly disheartened to hear that my colleagues and I, as veterinary professionals, were not considered to be included in Phase 1B of the COVID-19 vaccine distribution. I believe that vaccinating the front-line workers found in veterinary clinics throughout the state of Wisconsin will have a resounding benefit on local and state health.

Personally, I have walked to work every single day throughout this pandemic as we cannot do our work remotely. Just this week surgeries have been put off due to a COVID-19 outbreak throughout the surgery team. That is life saving treatment that we could no longer provide. This all comes at a time when veterinary institutions are experiencing an increase in caseloads. An article published in August by the *New York Times* states "Trupanion, a pet health insurer announced...it has 14 percent more cat and dog members than it did at the start of the year."

Not only are we seeing more patients, but these patients themselves are able to carry COVID-19. My service is responsible for disinfecting our isolation ward; the place a COVID-19 positive patient would go. Even if a patient isn't COVID-19 positive owners very well may be. My co-workers have to communicate and meet these owners in order to provide the care their pets need. This coupled with the often extremely crowded work environment means it is very easy for COVID-19 to be transmitted throughout the hospital.

The institution I work at does more than care for personal pets. We also work with the Madison Police Department to care for their horses and dogs. We work with Henry Vilas Zoo to provide treatment for their animals. And, we yield research into COVID-19.

I find it rather disgraceful that veterinary medicine is not only not included within healthcare but is now no longer considered front line and I urge you all to reconsider including veterinarians in phase 1B as the state of Illinois has.

Dear Secretary-Designee Palm and Members of the SDMAC Vaccine Distribution Subcommittee:

My name is Jodean Hipke and I am from Lena, Wisconsin. I have been a veterinary technician for 32 yrs and an office manager for the last 20yrs. I am writing to ask you to include veterinarian health care professionals in Phase 1b of the Wisconsin COVID-19 vaccination plan.

Our Clinic, Peshtigo Veterinary Clinic LLC has been providing health and wellness care to our patients throughout the pandemic. We have been doing curbside service since March while wearing masks and social distancing as much as possible. This can be difficult while transferring an animal from one person to another. Many times we have to endure verbal abuse from people who are upset with us for requiring masks and not allowing them into the building. This can be hard on us, but we know we are doing what is best for everyone by being safe.

We take the pandemic very seriously and have implemented symptom checker sheets that include daily temperature checks prior to arrival at work. These are filled out by our employees before every shift. Staff have been instructed to contact a supervisor before coming to work if there are any unexplained symptoms so that a supervisor can decide how to proceed. We have also asked our staff to remain diligent with masking, social distancing and avoiding large gatherings outside of work. Just like so many people, we are all suffering from some sort of anxiety caused by the unknown everyday and the isolation from family and friends.

We have been able to remain open without any shutdowns so far, but most of the time has been with a shorter staff due to exposure self isolations or other time off related to the pandemic. Being short staffed further contributes to the extra stress we are all feeling. It is an unprecedented time for us. so we do not have a good way of knowing what is to come. That really makes reassuring staff difficult because we have no way of knowing how long this will be going on.R Most of our veterinarians and staff are either in the high risk category or live with someone in the high risk category, so the concern for our safety or bringing the virus home is very real to us. We have also endured all of the hardships the pandemic has caused us without any extra hazard pay or recognition from our government or communities even though we are considered essential workers.

ne with their pets, it seems there are more animals needing care. We ntly more people and patients than a normal year. Many times we atient is coming from a home with a Cavid 10 positive person as household. We take the company of the cavid 10 positive person as and a second second

we reary recruiat veterinarians and staff should be in the phase 1b vaccination plan so that we can continue to offer care to our patients without as much concern for our safety. We will continue to practice safety measures, but feel this will give us an extra layer of protection. This will be of great benefit to us and our clients and will allow us to continue to treat all of the animals that continue to need care during these uncertain times.

To subcommittee members,

I would like to make a comment for the animal care staff at the Henry Vilas Zoo to be included in the Tier 1B for the COVID-19 vaccination. Our animal care staff work with the public and with many species that are susceptible to being infected with the SARS-CoV-2 virus. Primates, cats, skunks, ferrets, otters and badgers are all in danger of contracting the virus and becoming sick. The last four in that list are mustelids, the same family as mink, and we should be considered similar to mink farmers. Our job to care for these animals is essential and we have been at work every day since this pandemic started caring for them while following protocols for mask wearing and social distancing. We cannot work from home like so many other industries. The nature of our job is that many times we must be in close contact with our fellow zoo keepers and animals; this poses a risk for transmission even when wearing a mask. Just this week 2 members of the gorilla troop at the San Diego Zoo Safari Park in Escondido, CA were diagnosed with COVID-19 and they are showing symptoms of respiratory issues. We do not want to take that risk with any of our primates and especially not our endangered Bornean orangutans. All of the zookeepers were designated in Tier 1B in San Diego and are getting vaccinated as we speak.

We also deal with a decent number of guests who enter the zoo grounds and refuse to wear a mask even though we require them while attending the zoo. Even after speaking with them they get angry and raise their voices. I, along with the rest of the staff, would feel much safer about the animals and our coworkers if we could be vaccinated so as to mitigate the risk posed from guests entering the zoo and the general risk factor of grocery shopping, people not social distancing and the nature of our jobs to be in close contact with our animals and each other.

I understand this is a daunting task and these decisions are not taken lightly. I appreciate your time in reading this and know that our line of work isn't fully understood but know we are providing care that keeps our animals alive just like health care workers keep their patients alive. We would like to continue to do that safely.
