Dear Secretary-Designee Palm and Members of the SDMAC Vaccine Distribution Subcommittee:

My name is Peter Gaveras and I reside in Wauwatosa, Wisconsin. I am a Veterinarian who has been practicing for 33 years and a graduate of the inaugural class at the UW- School of Veterinary Medicine. I have served on the Executive Boards of the Wisconsin Veterinary Medical Association, Wisconsin Veterinary Medical Foundation, as well as several other local chapters serving my profession and understand what impact we veterinarians have on our world. I am writing to urge you and your colleagues to include all veterinarian health care professionals in Phase 1b (or earlier) of the Wisconsin COVID-19 vaccination plan.

Our practice is a small animal clinic and we offer veterinary medical services to small animal and exotic patients. Our revenues have experienced a decrease of approximately 8% for the year 2020 due to the Coronavirus epidemic. We have been practicing "curb-side" veterinary care since February 2020 in an effort to protect our staff and be as safe as humanly possible. While this has served to be inconvenient to many of our clients it provides us the best chance of avoiding COVID exposure and remaining available to our clients.

Since COVID hit the majority of our medical care services has been for sick or injured pets. If we were to have an outbreak among our staff it would force us to close our doors for a minimum of 14 days, resulting in our being unavailable to our clients to care for these beloved family members who help them emotionally weather the pandemic. It would present significant financial burdens on our staff as well, and possibly long term adverse health-related issues.

best served when veterinarians approach collective health issues with a "herd health" perspective, applying relevant epidemiologic principles. As veterinarians we are thought to be one of several lines of defense for our state and our nation when it comes to the recognition and reporting of zoonotic diseases. In addition to these direct services, veterinary practitioners report disease events and trends to state public health and regulatory agencies, collaborate with human medical counterparts on zoonotic diseases, and advise local health boards and commissions. These relationships would not exist if not

"One Health" is the integrative effort of multiple disciplines working locally, nationally, and globally to attain optimal health for people, animals, and the environment. Because of their expertise, veterinarians play critical roles in the health of animals, humans, and even the environment, but these roles are often overlooked or unrecognized. Nonetheless, veterinary medicine is the only profession that routinely operates at the interface of these three components of One Health.

Many veterinarians are employed by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) to protect public health by investigating zoonotic diseases and other diseases affecting the health of animals and people. CDC veterinarians are involved in investigating disease outbreaks throughout the world and developing programs to prevent the spread of diseases such as malaria, Ebola and avian influenza and now COVID-19.

As the CDC has expanded its role, scope, and influence in public health since its inception, so has the veterinary profession. Early in the history of the CDC, veterinarians in the U.S. Public Health Service and the CDC Veterinary Public Health Division helped reduce zoonotic diseases, especially rabies and foodborne illnesses. Today veterinarians serve throughout CDC in positions that address not only infectious diseases but also the entire spectrum of public health challenges such as environmental health, chronic diseases, human immunodeficiency virus infection and acquired immunodeficiency syndrome, immunizations, global health, migration and quarantine, health education, and bioterrorism. Veterinarians contribute as epidemiologists, laboratory scientists, policymakers, researchers, and surveillance experts and in environmental and disease prevention and control programs both domestically and globally.

Because veterinarians work at the interface of human, animal, and environmental health, they are uniquely positioned to view this dynamic through the lens of public health impact. Because animals share human environment, food, and water, they are effective sentinels for environmental, human, and public health problems, including bioterrorism and are key components in the control

Veterinarians help educate the public about prevention of zoonosis; we vaccinate large numbers of pets for zoonotic diseases, such as rabies and leptospirosis; and reduce the level of ectoparasites that can transmit human diseases and intestinal worms, such as roundworms and hookworms, which can cause serious health problems.

Today's veterinarians are the only doctors educated to protect the health of both animals and people. They work hard to address the health and welfare needs of every species of animal. Veterinarians play critical roles in environmental protection, research, food safety, and public health.

Veterinarians at the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Food Safety and Inspection Service (USDA-FSIS) ensure that only healthy animals enter our food supply. To prevent the introduction of foreign diseases into the United States, veterinarians are employed by state and federal regulatory agencies to quarantine and inspect animals brought into the country. They supervise international and interstate shipments of animals; test for diseases that could threaten animal and human health or our food supply; and manage campaigns to prevent and eradicate diseases, such as tuberculosis and rabies, that pose threats to animal and human health.

Veterinarians serve as epidemiologists in city, county, state, and federal agencies investigating animal and human disease outbreaks such as food-borne illnesses, influenza and rabies. They help ensure the safety of food processing plants, restaurants, and water supplies.

Veterinarians in the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) also protect the health and safety of animals and people through their work in developing disease surveillance and antiterrorism procedures and protocols. Veterinarians in the U.S. Army Veterinary Corps are protecting the United States against bioterrorism. They are responsible for food safety, veterinary care of government-owned animals, and biomedical research and development.

As you are aware we veterinarians serve in many critical capacities and exist as a key and invaluable component in regards to protecting our nation's health. We are proud to serve along side our colleagues in the other medical health professions to insure that we emerge from our COVID pandemic as safely and as soon as possible.

I urge you and your fellow representatives to seriously consider including us veterinarians in the early vaccine rollout for Wisconsin.

My name is Melanie Goble and I am from Manitowoc, Wisconsin. I am a veterinarian, and I am writing to ask you to include veterinarian health care professionals in Phase 1b of the Wisconsin COVID-19 vaccination plan.

I am a relief/locum veterinarian that travels to clinics that need veterinary coverage around Wisconsin and other states as well. Regardless of the clinic that I am working at, small animal veterinarians and their staff are unable to main physical distance within the clinic due to the size of our patients and often the physical size of the facilities. Although the risk of COVID transmission from animals is not great, cats and mink, for example have contracted COVID and mink have been shown to be able to transmit the virus back to people, as seen in the Netherlands.

People are spending more time with their pets, which are a major source of social interaction and mental health support to their families. This has resulted in more animals requiring care as owners are more likely to notice medical issues in their pets. Due to the small staff of clinics and the increased exposure to clients during the transfer of patients from owner to staff during curbside service, when one staff member is exposed or gets sick, it can cause the clinic to close resulting in animals not obtaining veterinary care. One cannot maintain a 6-foot distance from others when working on cats, dogs, and other companion animals. We are unable to work from home and due to the current laws cannot even provide telemedicine to animals for new problems or



Dear Secretary-Designee Palm and Members of the SDMAC Vaccine Distribution Subcommittee:

My name is Dr. Emily Lee and I am from Burlington Wisconsin. I am a veterinarian practicing at the Muskego and Wind Lake Animal Hospitals. I am writing to ask that you include veterinary health care professionals in Phase 1b of the Wisconsin COVID-19 vaccination plan.

As a Veterinarian I see numerous patients in a day and although our patients are not human, they do not come to the clinic without their owners. We are not able to perform our jobs from home and work in very close proximity to our assistants and technicians as they need to aid in the restraint of our patients. We absolutely cannot maintain adequate social distance from our staff. In the case of euthanasia, we allow clients into the building since it would be heartbreaking to not allow owners to be with their beloved pet in its final moments. However, this is the most likely time transmission of COVD-19 is going to occur. Clients, although they are told to wear a mask, are often crying into the mask which saturates it along with them pulling it off to give their pets a final kiss goodbye. Almost every time I have walked into the exam room, they have their mask off while we are not in the room and quickly put it on when we walk in. This makes our risk very high for contracting a respiratory virus in this situation, since they are crying and have nasal discharge which is aerosolizing virus particles into a very small room. When preforming the euthanasia, we are within a few feet of these owners. Unfortunately, we perform numerous euthanasias every week which makes our risk very high in this situation.

Veterinary health care workers are essential for animal health, which in turn affects human health. If we are shut down due to COVID, we are unable to provide preventative medicine to

hem when they are ill. Many diseases are zoonotic so if a pet is not eir owners. Again, we cannot perform our jobs from home and if we have suffer. Since I along we

the classe due to COVID, animals will suffer and potentially die if they cannot get the medical treatment they need. Owners mental health could also be affected if their pets cannot receive adequate patient care. The increased case load on all veterinary clinics means that if one clinic has to close, other clinics may not be able to accommodate additional patients. Currently the local emergency veterinary clinics have 3 to 5 hour wait times.

In addition, the veterinary community has made numerous sacrifices to help the human health care field. We do to the proper of the human hospitals have. We currently are having a shortage of exampleves and we are reusing our surgical masks since they have been on backorder since last spring. Studies have shown that animal including dogs, cats, and ferrets can carry COVID, yet we do not have the proper PPE to protect us from our patients if they are carrying the virus. Although we tell owners to delay appointments if they have a family member with COVID, they often times lie and still bring their pets in. I have had numerous instances where an owner told me everyone in the house has COVID after we finished examining the pet, which had now potentially exposed the entire staff. They mention it because they are worried their pet has it too. This is why vaccination of the entire veterinary staff is so important.



My name is Paul Schultz and I am from New Berlin, Wisconsin. I am a veterinarian practicing in the city of Muskego, WI. I am writing to ask you to include veterinary health care professionals in Phase 1b of the Wisconsin COVID-19 vaccination plan.

I understand that our patients are not humans. But they come attached to humans. We're doing curbside service, but not everyone has a cell phone, so were often out in the parking lot talking to owners, many of whom are not wearing masks. We're also letting clients in the building if they make the difficult decision to euthanize their pet. This is a time when people are wailing and sobbing and aerosolizing respiratory viruses, and almost never follow our request for them to keep a mask on. Clients with animals that are difficult for us to handle also need to accompany their pets into the building for exams, and routinely do not wear their masks properly. Finally, we work within inches of our assistants while restraining animals. Many of these assistants are not practicing social distancing in their time away from work. Multiple assistants have tested positive for COVID. Masks or not, this represents additional exposure for us according to the health department.

I would also like to point out that at the beginning of the pandemic, we respected requests to cancel all elective appointments and procedures/surgery to save supplies for human use. We're healthcare worker when it comes to re-using our surgical masks and face shields for 10 months to conserve PPE; we should also be considered healthcare



In addition, veterinary patients ARE susceptible to COVID-19. While uncommon, there are scattered reports of dogs and cats being infected COVID.



My name is Paulette Ewing and I am from the Milwaukee, Wisconsin area. I am a receptionist at Lakeside Animal Hospital in Glendale, Wisconsin. I am writing to ask you to include veterinary health care professionals in Phase 1b of the Wisconsin COVID-19 vaccination plan.

We are a small animal hospital that is currently doing a modified curbside approach. We come into contact with many clients daily. We are doing our best to socially distance, require masks, and only allow one client into an exam room at a time. A majority of our staff is over the age of 50, (I am 74) several with health conditions putting them at higher risk. In August we were closed for almost 2 weeks, due to a COVID positive case and a mandate from the health department. My name is Emily Renner and I am writing from Madison, Wisconsin. I am a veterinarian writing to ask you to include veterinarian health care professionals in Phase 1b of the Wisconsin COVID-19 vaccination plan.

I am currently a first-year resident studying to be a board certified Oral and Maxillofacial Surgeon at the University of Wisconsin Veterinary Teaching Hospital. This means my job is essential and I have worked in hospital to treat patients AND teach future veterinarians throughout the pandemic. Every day, I come into contact with many people including work colleagues, students, and owners. While everyone is required to wear a mask in hospital, the act of social distancing is not possible. The dental suite and operating rooms are small. Very small. The number of people required to facilitate a safe surgical procedure per patient is at least three. On top of that minimal number, we are a teaching facility. There are typically at least an additional three individuals. In addition to teaching duties during clinics, I also teach student laboratories during which I am in contact with a full class (100 students).

I am thankful the UW has enforced curbside medicine. This limits my indoor contact with clients. However, there is still contact outside to discuss treatment options, plans, and discharges. Contact with patients (dogs and cats) that are from a COVID positive

Dear Members of the SDMAC Vaccine Distribution Subcommittee:

My name is Tessa Arendt and I am from Madison, Wisconsin. I am a veterinary student and veterinary technician. I am writing to ask you to include veterinarian health care professionals in Phase 1b of the Wisconsin COVID-19 vaccination plan.

When I am not in school, I work as a technician at a walk-in clinic that serves upwards of 80 pet owners, a large population of whom are low-income, per day. Since we are a walk-in clinic, over the course of the pandemic, we have absorbed hundreds of clients who are otherwise unable to make appointments at their family veterinarian for both routine and emergency procedures due to staffing constraints and COVID-19-related pressures.

The need for veterinary care has not disappeared. Folks are lining up on multiple-month wait lists to get their pets the most basic, routine care. In fact, the demand has increased during the pandemic due to the amount of families who have welcomed new pets into their homes over the last 10 months. Veterinary clinics across Wisconsin are at capacity and running on fumes—I speak from experience. Whether it is a pet emergency or a simple, "it's just a Rabies vaccine, Fido needs it as it required by law," these requests, either big or small, add up to many additional hours of work each day. Couple that with a thin staff due to quarantines or infections, veterinary staffers are burning out. However, improving these conditions is something within your power.

Adding veterinary professionals to 1b would not place an undue burden on the general demand for vaccine compared to the supply (~2,400 vaccine series, if everyone were to sign up). There are many in this field (I'm sure you are hearing from them) that would get the vaccine today if they could. It's also my understanding that there will be incentives to states that administer more vaccines (i.e., they will receive even more doses). If you know you have a guaranteed population of individuals who will get this vaccine, why not open the door for them to do so?

That said, perhaps most importantly, veterinary professionals possess the skills needed to administer vaccinations. Vaccinating veterinarians will increase the amount of individuals able to physically administer vaccines to the public—only further increasing the capacity to deliver this public health intervention Wisconsin, and the country, so desperately requires.

My name is Cassie Gorbette and I am a veterinary technician in Madison, Wisconsin. I am writing to ask you to include veterinary health care professionals in Phase 1b of the Wisconsin COVID-19 vaccination plan.

I work at an emergency animal hospital, VCA Veterinary Emergency Service, with approximately 100 employees. We do not have the luxury of working from home. We also are unable to socially distance from each other, due to the nature of our job. I am unable to place an intravenous catheter without a coworker holding the animal, which places us in very close contact. This is just one example of the risk of exposure happening to us all day long. When one of our employees contracts COVID-19, we may need to close the clinic for many days, as we would all be exposed. Hundreds of animals would be without care, including life threatening conditions, painful conditions, and end of life procedures. All of the animal emergency clinics in town are already overwhelmed and do not have the capacity to serve all of the animals that need to be cared for. They are frequently shutting down due to a lack of staff and resources to accommodate all of the sick animals.

Dear Secretary-Designee Palm and Members of the SDMAC Vaccine Distribution Subcommittee:

First, I would like to thank all of you for your service and commitment to the collective health of our state. I am certain the challenges that have arisen with the COVID pandemic have been much more than any of you bargained for, so please know your efforts are appreciated as you help to get the vaccine out to as many people as possible, as quickly as possible.

My name is Sherry Billett, DVM, and I have been a practicing veterinarian in Sturgeon Bay, Wisconsin, since 1984. I am also a USDA /APHIS accredited veterinarian, whose additional training and regularly scheduled recertification provides me with education and insights into disease transmission and prevention that may not be apparent to others in the field.

I am writing to urge to you include all veterinary health care professionals in Phase 1b of the Wisconsin COVID-19 vaccination plan. My hospital is relatively small compared to some in larger cities, but the impact on my staff, clients, and patients would be devastating if my hospital had to close for a quarantine period due to exposure. We care for more than one hundred animals per week here, with a variety of ailments from the most minor to the most serious/terminal cases, and we repeatedly have people tell us that the other veterinarians in the area will not accept new patients because of COVID. If we were to close down, there would no other veterinary facility to care for them without having to make an hour's drive which, sadly, would be too late for some to receive the help they need. In addition, our ongoing cases would have no continuity of care and suffer as a result. If you are an animal lover like I am, these consequences to quality of patient care and the resulting long-term ill effects are simply unacceptable.

Whether or not you are an animal lover, consider the *human* impact of our veterinary hospital's staff, interacting with dozens of clients every day (which automatically places us at high risk of exposure), meeting in an 8 x 10 exam room for an hour with a single COVID-positive client who may be asymptomatic but still spreading the virus. No matter how careful we are, our exposure risk cannot be dialed down by nature of the care we must provide, and we would then proceed to serve as carriers of the disease to our other clients. Elderly clients, immune-compromised clients, and many others can quickly escalate this to a horrifying scale, and we would become a super-spreader point of contact-- all because we have no choice but to stay open and working for animal health.

Veterinarians and their staff members are essential workers and cannot simply close down and stay at home. The COVID vaccination plan that I read weeks ago from the CDC understands the nature of our work and places us squarely into the Phase 1b category. I personally and on behalf of my entire staff implore you to place veterinary professionals into this category to expedite our access to protection, and ensure continuity of care for our patients and communities.

My name is Suzanne Brahm and I am from the Milwaukee, Wisconsin area. I am a certified veterinary technician. I am writing to ask you to include veterinary health care professionals in Phase 1b of the Wisconsin COVID-19 vaccination plan.

We are a small animal hospital that is currently doing a modified curbside approach. We come into contact with many clients daily. We are doing our best to socially distance, require masks, and only allow one client into an exam room at a time. A majority of our staff is over the age of 50 (including me),

In August we were closed for almost 2 weeks, due to a COVID positive case and a mandate from the heath department. Our clients, patients, and staff members cannot sustain another COVID related closure. The entire profession has all been working hard during this pandemic to remain open; not only to continue to employee all staff members but to maintain quality health care for our client's pets, and uphold our oath to be disease sentinels for the general public. In the last few years the veterinary profession has suffered a high rate of suicide and compassion fatigue. And although this in no way compares to what our human medical counterparts are facing, it is no less significant. A vaccination would go a long way to help dissipate a small amount of the stress this profession is facing.

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To Whom It May Concern,

I am writing to implore you to include Zoo professionals in Tier 1B COVID-19 Vaccine Roll-Out in the state of Wisconsin. I am the Executive Director of the Racine Zoo, and myself and my staff are essential personnel who have been working every day through the pandemic. Regardless of closures, our animals still need care. Staff replacement is difficult as our animal card jobs are highly skilled. An outbreak leading to insufficient staff trained in working with large carnivores, for instance, could put us in a critical position.

We do not want to put any of our staff or animals at risk, and we do not want Wisconsin to be the next in the news for another zoonotic outbreak. While we are utilizing every PPE and preventative measure available, recent news out of San Diego Zoo, arguably the top zoo in the nation, of an outbreak among their gorillas shows zoos to be just as high risk of spreading as mink farms – perhaps greater, as we also interact with the public on a regular basis. We have worked closely with other zoos and the USDA to try to reduce risks. But with nearly 1,000 animals at the Racine Zoo, many of them, including great apes, big cats, mustelids (mink relatives) and more proven to be susceptible to COVID-19, vaccination is essential for our staff and a critical step for public health.

Throughout the summer and fall of 2020 and into today, our Zoo also has worked directly with children in both education and childcare. Our camps – Zoo Camp in the summer, and Zoo School during the school year – provide not only educational benefits, but are critical child care for parents. While we have followed all CDC recommendations, and additional restrictions recommended by the American Camp Association, vaccination of our education staff is crucial and should be included alongside all other childcare professionals.

The U.S. Department of Homeland Security understands these points, and as such, lists, "Workers performing services to animals in human care, including zoos and aquariums" as critical infrastructure workers in, "Advisory Memorandum on Identification of Essential Critical Infrastructure Workers During COVID-19 Response".

While we understand the need to prioritize receipt of limited vaccinations, including all zoo professionals in Wisconsin, defined as those working in institutions with live animals maintained primarily for public exhibition, would be a miniscule number compared to other groups included in Tier 1B. Please make the right decision and include zoo professionals in Tier 1B of COVID-19 Vaccine Roll-Out.

Dear Secretary-Designee Palm and Members of the SDMAC Vaccine Distribution Subcommittee:

My name is Jerome Gaska and I live in Columbus, Wisconsin. I am a production animal veterinarian. I am writing to ask you to include veterinary health care professionals in Phase 1b of the Wisconsin COVID-19 vaccination plan.

My practice is entirely devoted to serving dairy and beef clients who produce essential food. In my solo practice, I provide health and management services to clients who own over 50,000 head of cattle. Because my client's animals are in several states, I am actively involved in the regulatory medical health of these herds. This involves monitoring the herds for zoonotic diseases such as tuberculosis, brucellosis, listeriosis and salmonellosis. Testing, inspecting, and investigating possible outbreaks of disease are all essential services that I provide to assure a safe food supply chain. There is no substitute for being physically present while performing these duties. Not being able to travel and visit these herds due to sickness could have devastating effects to these client's cattle herds, their employees, and the general population.

As an example, tuberculosis testing needs to be completed for interstate movement of cattle. The injection and reading of this test are 72 hours apart and are required, by state and federal regulations, to be done by the SAME accredited veterinarian. Not being present to read the test would delay the retesting and movement of these animals by at least 60 days and fail to identify potentially infected cattle that could transmit this disease to humans.

Additionally, food animal veterinarians are very actively involved in the development and delivery of comprehensive vaccination programs for our client's animals. These clients and the public value and respect our opinions regarding vaccines. I have had many discussions about the development, safety, and necessity of the COVID-19 vaccine. Being able to share that I have received the vaccine would serve as a powerful signal that immunization is a necessary step to control this pandemic.

Please allow veterinarians such as me to receive the COVID-19 vaccine in the Phase 1b of distribution.
