While there is much in the proposed rollout of the level 1B COVID-19 agree with, there are several points I feel I must comment about. By way of background, I do not have a vested interest in any identified group, nor group feeling marginalized in this level. The earliest any member of my family can be vaccinated is 1C - for medical reasons.

To prioritize school district staff who do not have direct student interaction or are teaching remotely (as is the case with MPS) is wrong. Teachers who see students every day should be protected, but not a blanket inclusion of everyone, that is the easy way out.

To allow health care systems to vaccinate non patient facing employees is similarly short sighted when there are other more critical groups to be addressed. Advocate Aurora closed several of their offices with non patient facing individuals and sent them home to work last year- indicating they would probably never be back in the office since remote work was sufficient. Why do those individuals need vaccination before the general public - they don't . The health system is taking the easy way out.

The groups included in congregate living and more importantly excluded, is very troubling. Including groups a like inmates because it is an easily identified group and excluding secondary students who love in dorms because the group is too larger is not an explanation that makes sense. People either live in close proximity and are at risk or not. Size of the group shouldn't matter. What it looks like, is marginalized people are being identified with a higher priority- that is a form of discrimination (although not one people talk about).

Finally, to not include grocery store workers as essential is confusing. They were held up as vital in the early days of the pandemic and now are being forgotten about. The general public still needs to get food and vaccinating the workers is a needed layer of protection.

It is of great concern to me that after reading the, "Wisconsin State Disaster Medical Advisory Committee, Vaccine Distribution Subcommittee, Recommendations for the Wisconsin Department of Health Services for COVID-19, Vaccine Priority Group 1b," that most in the agricultural industry, especially meat processing, dairy, and migrant and seasonal workers are not included in recommended Phase 1B vaccination plan.

The COVID-19 outbreak in Wisconsin was widely reported to be among the most severe in the nation, and many of our state's earliest incidents of massive community spread occurred at food processing plants staffed largely by immigrant workers (Mizan & Mathew, 2020). To whom it may concern,

I would like to thank SDMAC VDS for taking the time to consider public input on which members of the community to recommend for inclusion in Vaccine Priority Group Phase 1b.

I support the VDS' current recommendation as it appears in the document submitted for public comment.

However, I would urge the VDS to consider adding an additional category to this phase: food service workers.

At the beginning of the Covid-19 pandemic health authorities statewide (DCPH locally) classified food services as an essential industry. DCPH explicitly stated the need to maintain food supply to the community as a priority. Farms, food processors, grocery stores, and food service operators worked to comply with additional public health mandates. They did so, obviously, out of economic necessity but also because the services they provide are in fact essential. People need to eat. They need groceries. Take-out or delivery of prepared ready-to-eat food is a necessary service. Further, current DCPH guidelines allow limited occupancy for dine-in food service operators. These industries have operated throughout the pandemic and will continue to operate in some form as it develops. It is urgent that frontline workers in these industries be prioritized for vaccination.

It is urgent for following reasons:

- -The nature of these essential jobs inherently elevates the risk of worker exposure to the Covid-19 pathogen
- -These workers demographically have more limited access to current healthcare systems
- -These workers are at elevated risk demographically for more severe illness and death from infection
- -These workers, when infectious, are at elevated risk to become a vector for further spread of the pathogen

Frontline workers in the food service industry cannot work remotely. They have wholeheartedly embraced recommended interventions as provided by public health experts including: employee health screening, facial coverings, surface disinfection, personal hygiene,

and physical distancing where possible. However, food service workers face a significant risk of exposure to the Covid-19 pathogen. Food service workers who have direct customer contact (i.e. the 'Front of House', delivery drivers, or retail grocery worker) face an elevated risk for infection due to the number and duration of these contacts. Regardless of the nature of these operations the risk is clear: these workers handle food, money and credit cards, dirty dishes or equipment, and spend time in close proximity to a large number of community members. They are a potential source for secondary contact within the operation. Those workers who do not have direct customer (i.e. agricultural workers, processors, cooks, dishwashers) contact face their own risks: the nature of their jobs and workplaces makes physical distancing impossible. They often share these workplaces with those who have direct customer contact. Any of these things elevates the risk of transmission. Together they present a material risk to the health and safety of these workers. Access to vaccination works to directly mitigate these risks.

Industry-wide food-service workers have limited access to current healthcare systems. Many of the jobs in this sector do not provide insurance through the workplace. Many workers in this sector are uninsured. Frequently their primary contact with health care providers is for emergency medical services. As a population they receive less preventative medical care, and are at an elevated risk for a variety of conditions which are known Covid-19 co-morbidities. Mildly symptomatic cases of Covid-19 are less likely to be caught and identified. Infected workers are less likely to receive medical care until their condition becomes critical. This puts additional strain on these healthcare systems. Vaccination of food service workers directly ameliorates these deficiencies in access to healthcare.

Demographically food service workers are more likely to be people of color and/or economically vulnerable members of the community. These groups continue to be disproportionally affected by the current outbreak. They face a higher rate of infection, and elevated risk of severe illness and death. Their aforementioned lack of access to health care systems compounds these risks, putting them at greater risk for hospitalization and death versus the general population. Access to vaccination works to directly mitigate these risks.

Finally, the risks to these workers represent a concomitant risk to the wider community if they serve as a vector for spreading the Covid-19 pathogen following infection. Many food service workers have more than one place of employment. Frequently they live in multi-generational households where isolating potential Covid-19 cases is difficult or impossible. The risks of transmission for workers with direct community contact go both ways, obviously. Prioritizing the vaccination of workers in these essential industries will directly act to mitigate the risk of these workers serving as vectors for further community spread of the Covid-19 pathogen.

In summary I urge SDMAC VDS to recommend food service workers for inclusion in Phase 1b of vaccine distribution. I thank the VDS for taking public comment, and for their work to help

the community during the Covid-19 health crisis.

Regarding the designation of Front Line Essential Workers, the following groups should absolutely be included, as they cannot avoid extended and varied contact with the public, many of whom do not observe proper COVID safety protocols:

- 1. Grocery workers cashiers, stockers, etc. must work in proximity to a wide range of individuals, who often shop in family groups (whether or not they need to) and who exhibit varying degrees of concern (or lack thereof) regarding mask wearing, hand washing, etc. These workers do not have the option to remove themselves from unsafe behaviors, nor can they speak out against it for fear of reprisal from the public and/or their employers.
- 2. Retail workers Same reasons as #1 above.
- 3. Restaurant Staff/Food Service Same reasons as above, with the added reasoning that A) Cooking staff often have to work in close quarters with one another, making proper distancing impossible and B) Serving staff must be in proximity to unmasked individuals who *must* unmask in order to eat.

All of these recommendations are due to the fact that workers are being continually pushed to return to work or face the loss of their jobs, shut-offs of utilities, eviction from their homes, inability to buy food, and defaults on any loans. Unless and until those underlying causes are addressed - unless and until it is decided that preserving human life is more important than "saving the economy" - all the groups I listed above are obligated to expose themselves to danger from COVID on a daily basis for the sake of mere convenience, and they should have, at bare minimum, prioritized access to the vaccine.

Dear Wisconsin State Disaster Medical Advisory Committee Vaccine Subcommittee,

Thank you for your efforts to ensure efficient and equitable distribution of vaccines. It is incredibly important and necessary that the Phase 1B recommendation for the COVID-19 vaccine include hunger-relief frontline workers and volunteers. These workers and volunteers are essential to continue the unprecedented distribution of food to those Wisconsinites experiencing hunger during the pandemic and economic crisis.

Meeting the needs of hunger-relief in our Wisconsin cities is essential, especially in difficult economic times like we are seeing today as a result of COVID-19. Prior to the onset of COVID-19 I volunteered in the Double Portion soup kitchen and food pantry in Neenah and saw first hand the need to support those less fortunate by offering a hot lunch and grocery items. Because I also support aging parents in their 80's and 90's who live in their own homes and need to protect them, I have not been able to serve the community since the onset of COVID-19. Prison guards are at elevated risk of contracting the virus and taking it home to their family and community.



- 1. Restaurants are an important part of the food supply chain feeding the public through carryout, delivery, and dine-in; keeping farmers, wholesalers, fishers, wineries, breweries, delivery drivers, and more, in business.
- 2. "Front of House" restaurant workers (managers, servers, hosts, bartenders, etc) have high level of interaction with the public and cannot control social distancing they work in close proximity to unmasked diners for extended periods of time.
- 3. "Back of House" restaurant workers (managers, chefs, cooks, dishwashers) are not able to physically distance from each other while cooking in kitchens.
- 4. Restaurant workers cannot telework and have been working throughout the entire pandemic.
- 5. A large amount of restaurant workers are Latinx. People in the Latinx community continue to be disproportionately represented among both people testing positive and people hospitalized for COVID-19.
- 6. In addition to government capacity mandates and closures, restaurants have regularly shut down when there is an employee COVID case and other employees are exposed and must isolate. When this happens, restaurants don't have enough workers to operate, and are forced to close for the isolation period, losing valuable sales, wasting product, and putting employees out of work for several days, or weeks at a time.
- 7. The restaurant industry has suffered and having workers vaccinated will make customers feel safer, help our industry rebound faster, and keep our restaurants open. Restaurant sales are down 50-70%, and it's even worse in the winter when they can't rely on outdoor dining. 

I note that the Vaccine Subcommittee explained its draft recommendations saying, "The Subcommittee recommends inclusion of (certain) groups as front line essential workers, based on the essential nature of their jobs, difficulty identifying trained replacements, or unique circumstances of employment." My spouse checks each of those boxes, yet would have to wait as much as several months under the current draft recommendations. I urge you to allow at least a limited medical exception for grocery workers with pre-existing medical conditions who are risking their lives in essentially public facing positions on a daily basis.

Vaccine plan public comment

Get vaccine into arms! A report this morning claimed that Wisconsin has slipped to last in the Midwest in terms of vaccine distribution. People are frustrated with this vaccine plan because it does not seem to be accomplishing the task of getting vaccine distributed. One of the criteria for new allocations is percentages of vaccine supply actually used in each state. If our state cannot do better, we will continue to lag behind other states.

Slow rollout is encouraging entities such as Janesville School District and Mercyhealth to take matters into their own hands. Guidelines need to be reasonable, meaningful, and productive in order to be respected.

- --[if !supportLists]-->1. <!--[endif]--> Kids need to be in school. With the requirement that face-to-face instruction begins if it is not already in place, school personnel who have contact with students should be high priority. No-contact personnel have no need for high priority and should wait for their age group.
- --[if !supportLists]-->2. <!--[endif]--> Seniors should be a high priority group beginning at age **65**. The CDC new guidelines recommend high priority for seniors **65** and above in order to decrease death and serious disease. New guidelines also determine allocations based on the number of people over 65 in each state. According to CDC statistics people 65 -74 years old have 5X higher risk for hospitalization and 90X higher risk for death than 18-29 year-olds. When compared to people in the age group 50 -64 years, they have a 4x greater risk of hospitalization, but the risk of death jumps from 30X higher to 90X. Your own statistics identify this group as one of the most vulnerable. Someone 65 years old is at much greater risk of sickness or death than the 20 year-old grocery clerk, 30 year-old postal worker, or 40 year-old person who is able to work remotely.

New variants that are more transmissible are popping up every day, putting this group at even higher risk for complications, morbidity, and mortality.

Medical services for everyone are burdened when this group utilizes more resources, and high healthcare costs are crippling to our economy. Some people of all age groups are afraid to visit doctor's offices or address medical concerns because they fear Covid exposure, and their needs become greater as a result. Others have had to delay necessary procedures when medical facilities have been overwhelmed.

Many grandparents have been transportation and daycare providers for their grandchildren. Families will experience a higher need for daycare as they return to work. Without vaccine, it

is unsafe for grandparents to provide the flexible, affordable, often free daycare that parents require to make it feasible and sensible to work.

Compassion??? Higher risk has caused this population to isolate more than less at-risk younger people. Mental health suffers. They have not seen grandchildren, brothers and sisters, or close friends for almost a year. Some will die, or they will lose friends and close family before it is safe to see them again.

Dear SDMAC Committee members,

Thank you for all of your work on the 1b guidance document. I can see the amount of time and care that you have put into it.

I am a professor at a small college, and I have a few thoughts I hope you can take into consideration in assembling your final document.

### Regarding the inclusion of higher education faculty and staff:

I agree that some educational outcomes cannot be attained in a remote format - laboratory courses, for example, and theater, and other experiential learning. In your Appendix E, I see that you phrase this as "any individual faculty, staff or administrator... for whom **direct interaction** with students is required..." and I agree. In such cases, the faculty member is at risk and to reduce their risk they should be offered a vaccine.

I also wish to express my support for your having included staff in this description. Our cleaning staff, for example, come into contact with the students, and many of them are in high-risk groups and a vaccine will significantly reduce their risk.

However, as I'm sure you know, there have been pressures from students, parents, and college administrators for *all* students to be brought back to the classrooms. Importantly, colleges are permitted to create *their own guidelines* for pandemic operations. My college is doing no testing and, to my knowledge, has done no work on ventilation or similar physical measures to reduce the risk of asymptomatic or presymptomatic transmission.

I teach four classes a day, and if I were in a room with 20 students for an hour, and then a different group of 20, followed by another group of 20 and another group of 20, that is at least **80 young adults that are exposed to one another and to me** three hours a week for 16 weeks. The vaccine has not yet been shown to significantly reduce the risk of a person's developing an asymptomatic case, and then passing that infection along to others. With no testing, there is a serious risk that I would be a vector of contagion for my students and, by extension, to the community at large.

I am also, of course, mindful of my own risk. Being in close contact with such a large number of young adults, the population with the highest incidence of infection, puts me in danger of long-term effects were I to be infected, such as heart damage, anosmia, and other effects that may yet emerge in the novel disease.

Make no mistake, I hate teaching remotely. My students hate learning remotely. It's by no means ideal, to put it mildly. But it does, for the moment, ensure that my classes are not a vehicle of community spread.

The reasons you give in your appendix for including faculty members are good ones – I do not mean to suggest that educators at the post-secondary level be removed from 1b. My faculty colleagues in the laboratory sciences and performing arts, as well as most of our staff colleagues, must be in direct contact with our students to carry our our educational mission. I bring up the above points only to say that the **guidance for colleges** needs to be very clear so that the vaccination program does not become a factor in what could be a large spike in infections in the young adult population that could then spread to the larger community.

### Regarding essential workers:

I have been concerned about grocery store workers and agricultural workers, and wish to encourage you to include them in an early group such as 1b.

Grocery stores, it is true, are able to offer curbside pickup, but we know that nationwide, because of the nature of their contact with the public there have been grocery store workers exposed on the job. Agricultural workers, of course, cannot work remotely, and very often must work in groups.

The work that both these groups do is important to the health and well-being of all of us. I encourage you to consider putting them in group 1b if it can be done.

Thank you for taking the time to read my comments. Good luck in your work. I am appreciative of all you are doing.

I retired from the WI Department of Corrections May, 2009 after over 22 years, the last 10 at Green Bay Correctional Institution (GBCI). I'm requesting inmates be removed from prioritization for COVID-19 vaccination but put all staff on the priority list. I limit my opinion to facility staff, not field staff which includes Probation & Parole Agents which I was for 10 years. I have friends that still work at GBCI and they have no problem posting pics on Facebook partying maskless with friends in crowded public places. With how STRINGENT the COVID PROTOCOL is at ORIGINAL INTAKE WITH INMATES, it's my opinion that STAFF IS RESPONSIBLE FOR the VIRUS INFILTRATING FACILITIES, NOT INMATES. I think it would be safer and wiser for the entire state to reconsider prioritizing inmates and instead MANDATORILY VACCINATE ALL CORRECTIONS FACILITY STAFF ...TB Tests are staff mandated ... and instead include grocery store employees as a priority.

#### REASON #2:

I do everything possible to be safe. I haven't seen friends or family for about a year. I haven't even had restaurant food since this started, no delivery, no pick up, nothing. I am not antimasker. I am 64 years, 5 months old so miss the priority cut off but willing to wait my turn. I live alone in the country and take every precaution as I only have myself to depend on if I catch COVID-19. I grocery shop once every 2-3 weeks yet have a high level of anxiety until 10 days after shoping hoping I won't have signs of COVID. I know I'm not isolated in my fear. I'd feel a lot safer knowing GROCERY STORE STAFF was IMMUNIZED, thus MITIGATING SUSCEPTIBILITY and reducing 10+ days of anxiety each time I go. Everyone shops, it's not an option, public exposure is at a high level for staff and customers at grocery stores. I don't have friends or family that work at any stores, this is a straight up unbiased opinion. My input is purely opinion with enough insight into how corrections facilities operate to strongly believe inmates shouldn't be prioritized as I feel it's a result of STAFF INTRODUCING the VIRUS, NOT INMATES. ### Dear Vaccine Priority Subcommittee Members

Thank you so much for the vital service you are providing by making the Covid Vaccine available to Essential Workers in our state. My husband and I have already received our first vaccine as First Responders in Lake Geneva, as Mark is a Fire Fighter and EMT, and I am a Chaplain to the Police and Fire Departments. Our second shot will be in February. We are immensely grateful for that gift.

I am writing on behalf of Walworth County Food Pantry (WC Food Pantry) staff, as well as the other 9 Food Pantries in Walworth County. The word "County" does not mean we receive money from our county. We raise all the money needed to keep WC pantry open.

I have served at WC Food Pantry for 3 years. We are the largest pantry in the county - and work to help provide food to other pantries as well as our own. Since the pandemic hit, our pantry went from having 72 volunteers in January through March of 2020 to 22 volunteers as of July of 2020. Every worker in our pantry is 65 or older now, due to the huge reduction in volunteers.

Our workload is overwhelming. But the volunteers know how essential it is for the Food Pantry to continue. We have significantly changed our procedures since July in order to protect our staff and guests. Unfortunately, 3 staff members contracted Covid 19, and one was quite ill for 3 months. Thankfully, they are all well now. But we are well aware of the daily risks workers face serving such a large number of people.

Over 600 FAMILIES come to us every month in need of food, baby diapers, baby food, adult incontinence supplies, menstruation pads and tampons. We also distribute Senior Boxes with shelf stable food from the government to those 65 and older.

At least 3500 guests are served by our pantry each month. It is overwhelming to serve so many, with only 22 workers. Our numbers grow each time we are open. I work in the front to welcome each guest and locate their file. Then I ask about their specific needs - put it to paper - and the guest leaves.

My coworker and I are behind plexiglass - but it has a 2 foot gap from the desk. At least 12 guests have told me in the last 2 months that someone at home or at work has covid. It is a miracle we have not all been infected yet.

The men in the back have a much greater risk. They assemble the food and other supplies requested by each family in several grocery carts. Then they take the food outside to the number on the car windshield that matches the number on the cart.

If the guest can't load the food in their car due to health problems, the men have to do it. They are exposed to possible covid cases from the driver and other people in every car they serve. This is in addition to working together in close quarters for several hours before we open, and then throughout the entire day. These workers are HEROES!!

If these 21 individuals are not frontline essential workers, I don't know who is! Since so many have lost jobs during the pandemic, and countless people have not received unemployment, these workers are literally saving lives every time guests come through our doors.

I can't count the number of individuals who weep when they come in. They are embarrassed, frightened, overwhelmed, hungry, and grateful. It may be hard to imagine that people do not have any food at home - if you are able to provide for your family.

In order for us to continue to meet these critical needs, in ways that are safe for all, it would be extremely helpful to make vaccinations available to all food pantry workers as soon as possible.

Thank you for your good work, and consideration of my request.



I write today as an employee of Certco, Inc. We are a wholesale grocery distributor who service independent grocery stores in Wisconsin, along with other states in the upper Midwest. We are owned by the grocery stores that we service.

I ask that there be reconsideration and you include our industry in tier 1B in the COVID-19 vaccination plan. CDC guidance on the COVID-19 vaccine distribution was released even before the announcement of a vaccine, and had our industry listed as part of tier 1B, as essential public facing workers.

I am disheartened to hear the committee is not following this guidance and is instead recommending our industry should receive the vaccine as part of tier 1C.

All healthcare workers, public safety workers and child care center workers are factored in tier 1A and 1B. Grocery workers and food supply essential workers were also mentioned in the same breath as these industries since early March of 2020 and called "Heroes". Yet, we are now left without the benefit of hope that these same individuals are getting.

Please reconsider your revised plan for Tier 1B to include our industry.

Moving the age tier down to include individuals above age 70, instead of 75 years of age, is protecting a new group that has been kept safe by the State orders to stay home, and they have been fed due to us and the stores we service.

I write you today as an employee of Certco, Inc. We are a wholesale grocery distributor who serves independent grocery stores in Wisconsin, along with other states in the upper Midwest. We are owned by the grocery stores that we service.

I ask that there be reconsideration and that you include our industry in tier 1B in the COVID-19 vaccination plan. CDC guidance on the COVID-19 vaccine distribution was released even before the announcement of a vaccine and had our industry listed as part of tier 1B as essential public-facing workers.

I am disheartened to hear the committee is not following this guidance and is instead recommending our industry should receive the vaccine as part of tier 1C.

All healthcare workers, public safety workers, and child care center workers are factored in tier 1A and 1B. Grocery workers and food supply essential workers were also mentioned in the same breath as these industries since early March of 2020 and called "Heroes". Yet, we are now left without the benefit of hope that these same individuals are getting.

Please reconsider your revised plan for Tier 1B to include our industry.

Moving the age tier down to include individuals above age 70, instead of 75 years of age, is protecting a new group that has been kept safe by the State orders to stay home, and they have been fed due to us and the stores we service.

#### Good afternoon-

I am writing to you with serious concerns regarding your decision to exclude the grocery industry employees as essential workers. I hope you will recall the situation we all found ourselves in just a year ago wherein the grocery industry found itself sieged upon when everything seemed so uncertain. This reaction alone should show you just how essential ALL grocery employees are. I truly believe that if you were to ask the average ordinary Wisconsin citizen what they consider to be essential services you would discover that having the ability to purchase fresh foods for the family would be at the top of their lists. Keeping employees healthy has been a particularly difficult task over the past several months and I think you would agree that it is crucial to keeping our doors open.

Beyond the necessity of keeping the grocery industry employees healthy and at their post to serve our citizens you should also consider the impact this decision will have on the individuals that have been showing up to work every day despite the risk to their health. So many of the employees in my store alone have gone months without seeing or being able to hug their loved ones because they understand the dangers of potentially exposing them to this deadly virus. We all show up every day even though we know that we could potentially be bringing it home with us. The mental stress of knowing you must do your part to serve your community but also understanding the risks to your significant others and your children is real. I see it and I live every day. I have not seen my 83 year old mother in over a year because I know I cannot quarantine long enough for me to feel certain I am not exposing her.

Think about the impact it would have on you personally if this industry was forced to shut down due to a lack of personnel. it has been very difficult to keep employees because they are fearful for their health and all that they are giving up to show up. Employees that are dedicated and remain on staff frequently find themselves in a situation where they have to miss work to quarantine in an effort to keep those around them from being exposed. Those around them include their loved ones as well as coworkers AND their customers. Can you think of any industry that regularly comes into contact with as many people on a daily basis as the grocery industry does? The store that I work in serves, on average 50,000, customers a week. That's a lot of potential exposure, for everyone! Our employees have been braving this entire situation for nearly a year! We have been praying for and waiting for the vaccine! You could feel the collective sigh of relief when the vaccine was finally authorized and we BELIEVED we would have access quickly. Now you want to take that away just as we were beginning to feel like we would get some relief from constant worry. It just isn't right!

I wonder if you have actually stopped to think about WHY certain sectors are getting the vaccine

before others? Is the decision made based on how many different people an individual MUST come into contact with each day to perform their ESSENTIAL job, or just how IMPORTANT you believe the job is? Do you know how many people the typical grocery stores serve on a daily basis? My store serves 6500 per day!

How many people does the average police officer come into contact with on an average day?

A doctor?

Nurse?

Firefighter?

Prisoners?

Even Governor Evers?

I understand that these professions are critical for emergency services and would not want to take away from that. I am just asking you to consider that they are NOT the only people who should be considered critical. Eating is necessary to sustain life!



Thank you for all the work you are doing during the pandemic.

General thoughts: If I understand things correctly, the State phases must follow the Federal guidelines, and within the Federal guidelines there are some things open to interpretation. Vaccination facilities must, by contract, follow the guidelines/recommendations as outlined. If this is accurate, I would like to see the interpretations in any phase to be as broad as possible. That way, if an approved vaccination facility has x# of vaccines, but they have more unwilling participants than anticipated, or several no-shows on any given day, they can still get the shots in other's arms. I do not know that asking these facilities to throw out unused vaccines (as is being reported in other states), or ship back vaccines (that must be stored and shipped under certain conditions and have a limited shelf life) for redistribution makes a lot of sense. Maybe work on eliminating penalties if a facility jumps to persons in the next phase?

Phase 1B Guidance: The guidance is well thought out. The rationales in the appendixes are clearly written. I will try to give my comments regarding the document in order of appearance:

Age: It appears that the age cut off is at 70 and above. Based on the recent Federal recommendation, I am for the 65 and older being in phase 1B.

Congregate living facilities: I agree with most of this. The only part I have trouble with is convicted felons in prison settings being put before other essential frontliners who have frequent face to face interactions with multiple people in the public and have stepped up to the plate throughout this pandemic. For example, election workers and grocery store/quick mart workers. Please, carefully think about this one.

Public facing essential workers: Again, I agree with most of this.

I think our election workers should be in phase 1B vs 1C. They are essential public facing workers.

I thought at one point our grocery store/quick mart store workers were in group 1B, however I

do not see them there now. One of the few industries that never closed because access to food is essential. If the grocery store/quick mart employees are not in 1B, they should be in phase 1B as essential public facing workers.

It is good to see that pre-k to 12 educational institutes include all employees. They all interact with each other and all are essential to emotional and intellectual growth and well-being of our student population.

What phase is people with high risk/comorbidities? Is this phase 1B or 1C? (Hopefully 1B)

I can appreciate the logistics of transporting, storing and vaccinating with these vaccines is challenging. Wisconsin was (still is?) way behind other states in its rate of vaccinating citizens. Approximately a week ago today, we were something like 40th out of 63 State/Territory/Federal Entities for vaccinations/100k persons. It appears that as of this morning, approximately 3/5 of what was shipped (or is in transit) has been administered. With the recent news, I am unclear as to if the other 234,000 doses we are allocated are still available, possibly in the state already, or not. If these are still available or in the state, then we only have approximately 1/3 of what is available in folks' arms. Either way, now that there has been a few weeks to work through the kinks of this process, I hope the State can ramp up its vaccination rates even more. Especially with more transmittable variants of this virus continuing to spread. I hope that you are looking at what has worked in other states and implement these strategies in our state.

And, as I type this, I see Andrea Pam is departing our State for a Federal position. With the expectation of more shipments of Pfizer and Moderna, and with both J&J, and AstraZeneca possibly becoming available soon, I also hope all avenues (i.e. replacement of our Health Secretary (or at least someone to run the vaccination program); Phase 1C, critical populations and phase 2 definitions; as well as approved vaccination sites) are in place to rapidly get the vaccines in the arms of willing recipients.

I am writing to comment on the subcommittee's suggestions.

I echo concerns of others that such a narrow definition of 1b will slow overall vaccination. I understand your concerns about supply and demand and agree that letting too many people into the 1b category (ie, move to the entire population) would create chaos. But, too narrow a category creates unnecessary delay and red tape in a situation where things must move fast. In a perfect world, vaccinations could be allocated to those who need it most first and continue on from there. However, this is not a perfect world and logistics are complicated and take time in a situation where there is no time to spare. Why not broaden the 1b phase to include more people, which will speed up the rate at which people can be vaccinated?

The solution that seems most obvious to me would be add essential workers and those 65 and older into 1b. It will take more time to get through 1b, because it is larger, but it will likely speed up the overall rate.

Essential workers have had no choice but to show up to work in person every day, putting themselves and families at risk in order to keep grocery stores open, manufacture COVID kit components, perform maintenance work etc. Equity aside, we need these worker to keep society running

Additionally, vaccinating employees at an organization (ie an "essential" company") would be less logistically challenging than individual citizens. As distribution is slated to improve over time, lower hanging fruit should be grabbed towards the beginning to create more immunity early on. As time goes on and distribution improves, it will be less of an issue to vaccinate individuals.

These are also more in line with the recommendations of the CDC, which recommends giving certain essential workers and those 65 and up priority.
