After learning today there is an opportunity to provide comments on the 1(b) vaccine roll-out recommendations, I thought I would add my thoughts even though they are unlikely to have much of an impact.

I have read the draft recommendations and watched the videos on the DHS Facebook page by Deputy Secretary Julie Willems Van Dijk. While I appreciate the deputy secretary's comments about the constrained supply of vaccine, I'd like to make the following observation:

There seems to be considerable data on the relationship of age with hospitalization and death from COVID-19, yet when looking at the inclusion of other potential groups to be included there isn't much data and the benefits seem more speculative. While there would seem to be great benefit from vaccinating in-classroom teaching personnel, from a practical view, the spring semester would be nearly over by the time this group would actually be protected. Would the benefits of vaccinating a 25-35 year-old teacher or a 27-year old non-EMS first responder with much smaller chances of getting sick be greater safeguarding a 65+ whose life is much more endangered by the virus?

As a 69 year-old with a BMI of 36, who doesn't turn 70 until June, it appears I would not be included in the next round. I might also add that neither of my parents who are 87 and 93 have been vaccinated yet, so it appears 1(a) hasn't been been achieved, which points to distribution constraints, not vaccine availability as the limiting factor. (I might add that my 87-year old mother was in a nursing home and the facility decided she couldn't get the vaccine because she was on the blood thinner Eliquis. I was unable to find any information that supported the nursing home's position. Indeed the North American Thrombosis Forum says exactly the opposite, so there seems to be a problem even with vaccination guidelines.)

It seems that health groups such as Group Health Cooperative which have the ability to vaccinate their members with Influenza vaccine every fall and have medical records systems that can be used to target eligible groups could be more effectively used in getting vaccines into arms, yet I have heard nothing about them being involved. Our information from GHC can be summed up as "We know nothing - don't call us, we'll call you."

I do hope someone actually reads this.

I am taking this opportunity to recommend that favorable consideration be made to set the minimum age limit at 65 rather than at 75.

My rationale for this consideration is that restricting the availability of the vaccine to only 75 and older misses the more significant group of elderly who are retired and more active in society which thereby makes them more susceptible to exposure of the virus; as well as being the larger grouping of the elderly that are more prone to major surgeries and procedures.

Since the first wave of vaccines included institutionalized elderly, you have already significantly addressed those 75 and older. Consideration must now be given to people like my wife and I who are each months yet from 75. She has undergone 2 surgeries and months-long physical therapy sessions in 2019-20. This group of essential workers has a huge impact on the ability of our state's children to thrive. In my clinical practice, I have seen a significant increase in children/adolescents with mental health issues during the pandemic and academic research also supports that claim. I also see many of my most at risk patients barely attending virtual school and falling further and further behind their peers. In addition to the direct risk to children, the need for parents to work strongly supports the need to have teachers and childcare providers protected and able to work.

I also support the state plan to have a measured and controlled roll out. I do not think this will slow the process, rather having clear guidelines will help us as health care organizations be better positioned to direct outreach and scheduling to patients who qualify for the vaccine at each phase. For this reason, I support 1b including those 70 years and up, rather than jumping immediately to 65 years and up. Going down to 65 years is too great a population for our current vaccine allocation and will result in many of the most at risk patients having to wait longer to get protection.

Dear, Members of the Wisconsin State Disaster Medical Advisory Committee Vaccine Distribution Subcommittee,

On behalf of AARP Wisconsin, and our 840,000 members statewide, we would like to submit public comments on the State Disaster Medical Advisory Committee (SDMAC) Vaccine Subcommittee recommendations for Phase 1b. As COVID-19 devastates families across the state, it is critical to ramp up production and distribution of the vaccine. We acknowledge the many challenges that the state is facing in determining how to equitably, safely, and effectively distribute the COVID-19 vaccination, and we offer the following comments:

While we are pleased to see those age 70+ are a top priority for Phase 1b, we strongly urge you to ensure that Wisconsinites age 50+ are prioritized to receive a vaccine. According to the CDC, people ages 50 to 64 with COVID are four times more likely to end up in the hospital than their younger counterparts, and worryingly, at 30 times greater risk for death. If you are 65 to 74 years old, the risks are even higher. Since the start of the pandemic, nearly 95 percent of the deaths nationally from COVID-19 have been among people 50 and older. The data clearly show that the older people are, the higher risk they face if they contract COVID-19. Therefore, we urge you to quickly ramp up vaccinations of Wisconsinites age 50+.

For years, the long-term care system has been shifting away from institutional care in nursing homes to home and community-based settings. Here in Wisconsin, a significant percentage of long-term services and supports are provided by the IRIS and Family Care programs. We thank the Vaccine Subcommittee for recommending that members of the IRIS and Family Care programs are included in Phase 1b. We strongly urge the full State Disaster Medical Advisory Committee to approve this recommendation and prioritize people receiving care in these additional settings, along with their staff, to receive a COVID-19 vaccine.

We cannot stress enough how eager people are in Wisconsin to receive a COVID-19 vaccine. AARP Wisconsin encourages the SDMAC to continue to base recommendations on evidence while quickly finalizing plans for vaccine administration for all Wisconsin residents.

I have reviewed your rcommendations for Phase 1 B in regard distribution priorities for distribution of the COVID 19 vaccine. Although you state a limted statistical rationale for placing persons age 70 and over. However, many states have determined that it is more appropriate that persons 65 and over should be included in Phase 1B, rather than 70. I believe that the people ages 65-70 are just as much at risk of severe COVID 19, hospitalizations, death and especially severe permanent and long term cardiac, brain, cognitive and vascular maladies arising from COVID 19 infection. 

I am the mother of a 37 year old woman with Stage 4 breast cancer. She is not alone in any way as a cancer patient currently being treated except that the people who are making decisions about vaccination priorities do not even seem to recognize the existence of people who are under 65 and extremely vulnerable to dying of Covid. Unlike so many other groups of people who are jockeying to get included in 1B, people with serious illnesses do not have any organized groups lobbying for them. They are invisible people.

She and I and her dad realize that there are people like frontline workers in health care and emergency services and those living and working in congregate living situations like nursing homes deserved to be vaccinated first. But it's important to realize that she and others who are in a similar situation cannot simply stay home. She receives her care at the Carbone Cancer Center at UW Hospital. When she goes there for chemo, she has to wait in a room which is often so full that seats are not available or she has to pass by prisoners who are also being treated for cancer and who are shackled and come from correctional facilities that are experiencing outbreaks of the disease. I've been monitoring the Zoom meetings of the Vaccine Subcommittee and I appreciate the opportunity to make public comments. As a resident of the State of Wisconsin I have a vested interest in when the vaccine will be offered to various groups

To qualify my comments I am approximately 5 months away from attaining the age of 65. I also have 3 qualifying medical conditions (from your list) that qualify me in the high risk category.

First I would like to say that all groups should be qualified with the condition if someone has had 2 positive Covid tests they should assume to have immunity and be delayed 5 months from the date of their 1st positive test no matter what group they are in. Alternately assuming the vaccine will be readily available by June they could just be moved to the last phase proposed.

Was the group greater than 16 yrs. old with multiple high risk medical conditions purposely left off the page that described each group with their associated populations or an oversight?

It's obvious that age as well as the high risk medical conditions impact a persons risk of death. I reached out to the White House, Dr. Fauci and the Surgeon General regarding exactly Janet's comments about in-home care she made in the Jan. 8th Zoom call many months ago. We have been lost in this process. To remain living at home I require in-home care workers coming in 3x's/week. I come in close contact with these workers and have been incarcerated for lack of a better word for the last year. THE SINGLE HIGHEST 1b PRIORITY SHOULD BE PERSONS 65 YEARS OF AGE AND OLDER

<u>Age is the single greatest risk factor for mortality due to COVID-19</u>. President-elect Joseph Biden has specifically directed that persons 65 and older, a population that has accounted for 80% of the deaths to date, be made a high priority. Due to the high risk of hospitalization and death in this population vaccination of this population will result in a threefold benefit: (i) reducing net overall hospitalization, (II) reduction of the net mortality rate resulting from COVID-19 disease and (iii) engaging a readily identifiable population that will be enthusiastic to support rapid expansion of the vaccination rollout. The federal government is now going to release the vast majority of the vaccines as they are available, which will provide the resource so more senior people can get vaccinated quickly. Faster rollout, facilitated through this class of people, will serve the greatest public good by hastening attainment of herd immunity while simultaneously protecting the largest at-risk population.

Risk of COVID-19: Age is the single greatest risk factor for mortality due to COVID-19. Using those diagnosed with COVID-19 age 18-29 as a comparison group, those age 65-74 years are 5 time more likely to require hospitalization and 90 times more likely to die from Covid-19.

Benefits of COVID-19 vaccination: Due to the high risk of hospitalization and death in this population vaccination of this population will result in a threefold benefit, (i) reducing overall hospitalization, (ii) reducing the mortality rate resulting from COVID-19 disease and (iii) engaging a readily identifiable population that will be enthusiastic to support rapid expansion of the vaccination process.

Population size and vulnerability: The 2019 Wisconsin population of those age 65-69 is estimated to be 338,616 based on the "<u>Annual Estimates of the Resident</u> <u>Population for Selected Age Groups by Sex for Wisconsin: April 1, 2010 to July 1,</u> <u>2019 (SC-EST2019-AGESEX-55</u>)" as enumerated by U.S. Census Bureau, Population Division data for June 2020.

Additional considerations: Age is an independent factor that is unrelated to the ability to access medical care, so can be determined and applied more equitably and readily than identification of individual co-morbid conditions that depend upon the ability of individuals to access medical care and upon a record of the medical condition(s). Further, feasibility of identification of group members and implementation of the cadre has been deemed by SDMAC as very high.

Without this requested prioritization, vast numbers of seniors aged 65-69 will be hospitalized and die as a result of their vulnerability and the CDC's anticipated spread of the SARS-CoV-2 B.1.1.7 Lineage.

TRIAGE OPTIONS

Given that, as of January 15th, 518,251 or <u>9% of people in Wisconsin have tested</u> positive for Covid-19, Group 1b should explicitly provide for the deferral in vaccinating people testing positive for at least 90 days to free up vaccine for those who have no immunity.

Finally, the draft SDMAC draft recommendations for Group 1b total, without inclusion of those aged 70+, approximately 500,000 people. Within that group are ages ranging up to 50 years that are at significantly lower risk of hospitalization and death than the 65+ age class. Relative to the 65-74 age class, the risk of death from Covid-19 for age class 30-39 is approximately 4.4%, while the relative risk of death for age class 40-49 is 11.1%. Based on 2019 U.S. Census Bureau data, Wisconsin's population between 20 and 49 years of age is approximately 2.2 million people. Assuming a provision could be made for appropriate exclusions for medical comorbidities, deferral of those persons aged 49 and under currently included in Group 1b to Group 1c might arrive at an equity that, on balance, reduces the state's total number of deaths from Covid-19.

Follow the CDC guide lines for vaccinating people over the age of **65** not 70 as you are proposing.

Thank you for this opportunity to comment on Phase 1B proposals. We understand the reason for prioritizing certain groups of people. We have the following comments regarding Phase 1B:

- We feel that the age range should be at least down to age 65 for this phase, as recommended by the federal government.
- Consider also that since the beginning of the pandemic, we have heard people over age 60 are at higher risk for hospitalization or death. This would, in our opinion, make a strong case for vaccinating those over 60 as soon as possible.

We see many of the population under 60 getting out and interacting while we and others over 60 have been staying home, not going to church, not going into stores, not eating out, etc. We would personally like to feel that we can at least go out and do some minimal activities that might involve closer contact with others. Instead, we continue to avoid contact until we can get a vaccine.

• It is disappointing to look at the vaccine status page for Wisconsin to see as of 1/15/2021, although 373,100 vaccines have been shipped to Wisconsin, only 213,056 have been administered.

We understand that it is taking time to coordinate scheduling people to get vaccinated when you don't know how much vaccine you will have. However, there are many of us who would come at a moment's notice to a local location to get a jab. Contact us!

• Our last concern is communication. How will anyone know when it is their turn to get a vaccine? We haven't seen anywhere on the DHS covid-19 pages telling us how we will know this. We have sent email to DHS, WIR and primary care physician and each one points to the other to answer the question. Communication on how scheduling will happen would definitely relieve some of our anxiety about when we will get a vaccine.



First, thank you for all you do for our state and thank you for opening this to public comment. I know decisions should be made and implemented as soon as possible.

For 1B, while age is a great way to assess covid vulnerability, 70+ may not be inclusive enough to those at risk solely based on age. Recommended by the federal government and the CDC, states are now greenlit to vaccinate anyone 65 and older. Those over the age of 65 are at a far greater risk than the rest of the general younger population. If you do not open it up to everyone 65 and older, it would at least be beneficial to include anyone over 65 with documented medical conditions. This would then be in addition to all those age 70+. 

I reviewed the Wisconsin State Disaster Medical Advisory Committee Vaccine Distribution Subcommittee Recommendations for the Wisconsin Department of Health Services for COVID-19 Vaccine Priority Group 1B document, and following is my feedback:

- On page 3 where it indicates:
 - The Subcommittee recommends the below considerations if vaccine supply is constrained such that additional sub-prioritization is necessary: Individual demographic characteristics and medical conditions have been identified that place individuals at higher risk of severe illness from COVID-19 infection.5,6 As such, vaccinating entities should consider using these factors if additional sub-prioritization is necessary. Of note, logistics may necessitate subprioritization to occur only at the level of adequately large population cohorts. Demographic Age 65+7 Black, Latinx, Native American Socioeconomic vulnerability Medical Conditions Asthma Cancer (active) Chronic kidney disease Chronic lung disease, such as chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD) Chronic metabolic disease Diabetes Heart conditions, such as cardiovascular disease, heart failure, coronary artery disease, or cardiomyopathies Hypertension Immunocompromised conditions Solid organ transplant resulting in immunocompromised state Obesity (Body Mass Index (BMI) of 30 kg/m2 or higher) Sickle cell disease Smoking Intellectual or developmental disability8 Pregnancy

The above does not match up with the recommendations you have for inclusion in Phase 1B. Why would sub-prioritization be needed if these groups are not even included with group 1B? Although I agree these groups would need prioritization over the general population, I'm not sure if your intent in this document was to have the above included in group 1B, or after group 1B. Clarification might help.

- General feedback on vaccination sign-up once available to group 1B:
 - Some people do not have access to the internet (example my In-laws located in Green Bay who are 76 and 80, with underlying health care conditions and who live at home.) They also do not have a cell phone. As a result they would not be able to sign up for a vaccine online, or create an account with a local health care provider. People in this situation will need a safe way to timely get signed up and to obtain the vaccine. We are already seeing reports that the local clinics are asking people not to call them with questions about the vaccines, as they are overwhelmed with phone calls. Any guidance you can provide here is appreciated.

I much appreciate the opportunity to provide feedback. Thanks for all the work you're doing to keep Wisconsinites safe.

I was optimistic when I saw the CDC recommendation that people 65 or older should be in the 1b category as the next group to have priority for the Covid 19 vaccines. The recommendation by the review board to make the age limit 70+ has pulled the rug out from under me.

I am 67 years of age. I have been fighting to overcome the Rheumatoid Arthritis that struck me at age 30. RA is a immune system disorder as you are probably aware. I am now at the point that I am taking a weekly injection of a biologic prescription that suppresses my immune system. The normal dosage is every other week. My RA doctor felt that I a higher dosage was needed as several other medicines did not reduce my flare ups. (I had been on Humira for about 8 years but my body eventually rejected it.).

I am therefore concerned that the subcommittee recommendations make no allowance for the CDC recommended inclusion of the 65 - 69 year old age group. In particular those of us in that age group who have additional health risks. When you check the CDC website, it lists cancer as one of the conditions that places adults at an increased risk of severe illness from the virus that causes COVID-19. Age is another factor that places people at greater risk of requiring hospitalization or dying if diagnosed with COVID-19.

When I check Wisconsin's priority list for receiving the vaccination, I fall into Phase 1C, included with all people who are between ages 65 to 75. Even in light of the fact that I fall into two high risk groups, I am given no special placement and treated as if I have the same risk factors as anyone else in that age group.

I am writing this letter on behalf of myself and all adults between ages 65 to 75 who are also at high risk due to a medical condition. I am aware that this is being reviewed by SDMAC.

I understood that the priority list was created on the basis of increased risk, which is why people in nursing homes and assisted living facilities are on the top of the list. People who are ages 16 to 64 with high-risk medical conditions are given priority over their peers without medical conditions and will be getting the shot earlier in Phase 1C. Why are adults, ages 65 to 75, with medical conditions not afforded the same respect?

Please accept the following statement as my public comment to the proposed Wisconsin State Disaster Medical Advisory Committee ("SDMAC") Vaccine Distribution Subcommittee Recommendations, as they relate to the Phase 1B plan for distribution:

Wisconsin has been slower than most other states in its distribution of the Covid 19 vaccine ("the vaccine"). While other states are setting up large vaccination centers, including large-scale drive-up centers), Wisconsin is now just getting its first large vaccination center set up at the Milwaukee Center. Wisconsin has always been widely known as a leader in medical technology, but Wisconsin is falling far behind the other states regarding the vaccine. In listening to the DHS representatives speak about Wisconsin's vaccination distribution plan, it appears that the administrative snags and mounting red tape is what is holding Wisconsin back. Getting administrative paperwork and overly-detailed and burdensome recordkeeping plans perfected is not more important than getting needles in people's arms. Please don't lose sight of the mission: to vaccinate as many as possible as quickly as possible.

I feel that the Phase 1b recommendations proposed by the SDMAC are not acceptable, in that they are not consistent with the CDC's most recent guidelines. The CDC recently provided new guidelines that expand vaccine eligibility to everyone age 65 and older, as well as to those with comorbid conditions. This is the subgroup listed on page 3 of the SDMAC's recommendations. Per the proposal, this group will only be given priority AFTER those listed in the proposal as Group 1b, and ONLY if there is still a shortage of the vaccination after Group 1B has been vaccinated. The way that I read this is that the page 3 subgroup will only get any type of priority if there continues to be a shortage of the vaccination. How does this prioritize our at-risk population?

Wisconsin should have large-scale vaccination centers ready to go and should follow the CDC's recommended guidelines. This doesn't mean that the proposed Group 1b persons should not be included, but Group 1b should be inclusive of those listed groups, as well as the 65+ and underlying medical conditions group, as recommended by the CDC. This ensures that the most vulnerable Wisconsinites will be prioritized, and it makes Wisconsin policy in conformance with the CDC recommendations. Any other plan reveals that Wisconsin's concern for its documentation and red tape is greater than its concern for the lives of its residents.



First thank your work on this important issue. I have three comments.



2) The CDC has just recommended including 65 and older in 1b. Stats have shown that including 65 and older would have several positive immediate impacts in ending this pandemic. Those 65 and over have a higher percentage of death and hospitalization. Vaccinating this demographic will open hospital beds and as a result free up beds and staff for other health issues. Additionally doing so will also have a more immediate impact on reducing exposure of covid-19 for the first responders and other essential workers dealing with this group.

3) The quality of life issues are not only physical but mental/emotional. I have heard many times that it "will only be for a year". At age 70 one year represents a significant remainder of my life. We have curtailed all of our activities that involved being indoors and with people outside of our household. At 65 and older that most likely means your immediate household is 2 people. 





All available data collected worldwide clearly demonstrates that the truly vulnerable population is tied to age if mortality is the primary concern. Certainly the increased exposure to Covid of certain work and other population groups increases their likelihood of contracting Covid, data shows that chances of dying are greatly diminished when age over 70 is not a factor.

So why would we ignore the greater possibility of death facing the older population by diverting vaccines to more healthy younger populations that may be a bit more likely to contract Covid but would be far more unlikely to die from Covid.

I know that there are many people like me who are waiting patiently to be vaccinated. Many have grandchildren who have not been seen in person for a year. There are others who are not fortunate enough to be able to have groceries, etc. There are those who cannot retire and still must leave their homes to go to work leaving them at risk for contracting the virus. I realize that not getting a haircut is not an extreme deprivation, but it is an example of how truncated peoples' lives have become in this pandemic.

The other day I was waiting to be tested by UW Health as a requirement for a medical procedure. The process is to wait in line in one's car to be tested. There were two lanes, one for testing, the other for immunizations. While waiting in a half-mile long line for an hour to be tested, NO ONE passed through the immunization line. There were many medical staff waiting to immunize but there was no one to immunize. This was very discouraging and disheartening to those of us who so desperately wish to be immunized. It also is a snapshot of how slow the distribution of vaccines has been going at this time while the virus is raging. I hope that the age requirement will be lowered in order to protect more people who are vulnerable as well as to speed up the vaccination process for the general public.

I thank you for your attention to my email and I wish you well.


As an individual who is 73 with heart disease, I was especially gratified to see that your committee saw fit to include anyone age 70 and older in the group eligible for Phase 1b vaccine distribution, and I sincerely hope that the DHS will adopt this recommendation.

Earlier reports that the subcommittee would suggest a cutoff at age 75 had been particularly disheartening to me as someone who (like many other "seniors") rigorously tried over the past 10-11 months to follow the CDC's statements about social distancing, mask wearing, and so forth. A fair number of us who happen to be widowed with no living children or siblings have had to forego virtually all other meaningful human interactions as well - e.g., in-person religious services, normal routine hugs and handshakes, etc.

I recognize that my own personal sacrifices in that regard are certainly not unique - nor do they even come close to the pain and suffering endured by the people in our State and nation who have lost loved ones during this pandemic. Such individuals, as I know the committee is fully aware, have often been denied the chance to say "good bye" in ways which they otherwise normally would have been able to do. I am responding to the published information surrounding your latest recommendations for Phase 1B of the Covid 19 vaccination priority list. It appears that you are including people aged 70+, although many of them will be included in the first phase as long term care facility residents. But more and more states are including people 65+ in the second group of vaccinations. Looking at the data provided on the Wisconsin DHS website, it would appear that lowering the age limit to 65 or even 60 would make more sense. For ICU admissions, the age group **60-69 had the greatest number--547.** That dropped to 514 for the age group of 70-79, and dropped even more drastically for the 80+ groups. Total hospitalizations for the 60-69 age group was 4,510, 70-79 was 5,169, and 80-89 was only 3, 942.

So the group aged 60-69 placed the greatest burden on the hospitals for specialized intensive care, and was the second largest group for hospital admissions.

In order to avoid overwhelming the health care system in our state, please drop the age limit for the next vaccine group to 65 or 60. Many states are now doing this, and the federal government now recommends it. As a retired educator, I am well aware of the problems surrounding schools right now, but the fact remains that most of the younger teachers will not have a serious illness if they contract covid-19. The same holds true for prison inmates and anyone else you are considering for the second category.

The people most vulnerable to serious illness and death need priority, and the data clearly shows that the biggest risk factor is in people over 60.

Thank you for giving me the opportunity to offer my suggestions regarding your recent recommendations for vaccine group 1b.

I am a 68 year old male from Neenah Wis. and I desperately want to get the vaccine as soon as possible as I have basically been staying in my home and not going anywhere at all or seeing anyone including my family since the end of last March and believe me its taking its toll. I think the starting age for group 1b should be age 65 not age 70 as you have stated and the reason I suggest starting at age 65 is if you look at the CDC diagram that I have attached below you can easily see that the CDC states that the risk of death or hospitalizations are exactly the same in the 65 age group as they are all the way up to the 75 age group. Your recent suggestions to start in the 70 year old age group says that people in that group have a high hospitalization rate and the highest mortality rate which is not totally accurate because according to the CDC guide people in the 65 year old age group so I believe you should change the starting age to 65 years old.

I also disagree with your recommendation to include mink farmers, prisons and jails in group 1b unless they are in the 65 year old age group or higher. While I agree these groups are important to protect I dont think they should take priority over anyone 65 years or older and should probably be included in group 1c but not 1b.

I think there should be more supervision or stricter guidelines for the hospitals that are currently administering the vaccines because I have first hand information that there are some people that do not currently fall in group 1a but are getting the vaccines anyway well ahead of when they are supposed to. It has come to our attention that the newly released Wisconsin SDMAC 1b vaccine group (Jan 13) included people 70+ and people living in congregated settings. While this is very much appreciated, vaccine group 1b fails to include seniors 65+ living in multi-generational households. Many of these families have school-age kids (K-12) living in the same household as seniors and have had to continue all-virtual learning at the risk of depression or other mental issues for the safety of their grandparents. While everyone can understand the desire to be highly organized and vaccinate health care workers and residents in long term care facilities first, we have now vaccinated 176,165 people and have 373,100 shipped doses, and 607,650 allocated. It seems that we can safely pick up the pace of administration without risking running out of supply of vaccine. Also, since the Trump and Biden administrations have agreed to release their second doses and there are no production issues that we know of, we could reasonably assume that there should be more doses on the way.

As with any other complicated task involving so many moving parts there will be logistical challenges along the way. Some of these challenges will not become apparent until they are encountered during the roll out. This is why I suggest we move forward with each of the 3 groups mentioned (1. people over 70 who are not in long term care facilities, 2. staff and residents of congregate living facilities, 3. public-facing essential workers), as well as everyone over the age of 65, to prevent further delays in our vaccine rollout. The logistical challenges can then be addressed as they arise but fewer doses will sit idle on the shelf while the pandemic rages on.

Ladies and Gentlemen, I am 80 years old, my wife is a little younger. We both have existing medical issues. If either of us is infected with COVID-19, the probability is very high that we will be hospitalized, assuming that a bed can be found for us, and that we may very well die. The consequences suffered by either my wife or me after being infected with COVID-19 are much more severe than the consequences suffered by a younger essential worker who has been infected by COVID-19. For us this is a probable life or death situation. We have been very careful over the last ten months not to contract COVID-19, knowing that one mistake could be fatal. We have avoided other people as much as possible, always wear a face mask when out in public, have stopped going to church, do our grocery shopping at 7:00 AM, have not been in either of our children's houses and have not been in physical contact with any of our grandchildren. We have been fortunate to not have contracted COVID-19, however the risk remains high and the consequences severe. Adopt the changes announced by Health and Human Services Secretary Azar on January 12, 2021 and begin vaccinating people over 65 immediately. Time is critical and does not allow for meetings, public comments or debate. Secretary Azar's changes were created in an attempt to speed up the vaccination process. To ease the burden on health care personnel the vaccine could be administered in phases starting with the oldest first and working down to those 65 years old. Doing this will enable reaching those at higher risk regardless if retired, working, in prison, or living in group homes. I believe the goal is to reduce hospitalizations, loss of life and the burden on healthcare workers. I would think this would reduce the burden sooner. There are locations that could be utilized to administer the vaccination such as healthcare medical facilities, drug stores, school gyms, state fair park (could be inside and drive through at state fair park) and other large facilities to administer vaccines. 
