- 1. The meeting was called to order at 10:03 a.m.. by Tracey Griffith, Committee Co-Chair, in conformance with the Wisconsin open meeting laws.
- 2. Mr. Owen Smith recorded attendance. A quorum was present.
- 3. Mr. Smith will email the roster to members after the meeting.

4. For action: approve the minutes

The minutes were approved as written.

5. Discussions

a. BAS Director's Call with State Committees

Director Polk reviewed that, with the support of the Wisconsin Apprenticeship Advisory Council, the Bureau hosted the first virtual Director's Call with State Committees this spring. Seventeen state committees and 112 participants attended. The objectives were to communicate apprenticeship topics that pertain to most or all state committee in a single forum and to focus each committee's agenda to it unique policies and content.

Director Polk asked for feedback to report to the WI Apprenticeship Advisory Council.

The state committee supported the streamlined forum. The committee noted that the meeting presented a large quantity of information, which would be helpful to have captured in minutes. The committee recommended administering an anonymous survey for feedback.

b. Modified Format of State Committee Meetings

Mr. Polk reviewed that discussing apprenticeship-wide topics during the Director's Call will likely shorten each committee's agenda by half. The resulting agendas will focus on each committee's unique policies and content. Topics from the Director's Call can be discussed in greater detail at the meetings, if needed.

Mr. Smith concurred and emphasized that the Director's Call does not minimize the role or voice of state committees. Rather, it focuses their agendas. If the policies and content established by a state committee work well, the meetings will likely be short.

Attendees did not have questions or comment.

c. Review of the Wisconsin Apprenticeship Manual

Director Polk reported that the *Manual* was reviewed by the Wisconsin Apprenticeship Advisory Council's Policy and Standards Subcommittee and is currently under review by the full Council. The Council will meet on June 6 to approve the working draft, which will begin a 90-day public comment period. The Bureau will make the "old" manual, the revised manual, and a table of revisions available to the public via its website. Input can be emailed to apprenticeship@dwd.wisconsin.gov.

Attendees did not have questions or comments.

d. Review of the state standards.

Mr. Smith reviewed that the *Manual* provides the boilerplate language for all state standards. The boilerplate language comprises 90% of any committee's standards. The remaining content is specific to the state committee, e.g. committee size, contractor organizations, applicant assessment procedures, etc.

Once the *Manual* is approved by the Council, the Bureau will revise the boiler plate language and format of all state standards accordingly and present them at the fall meetings. Mr. Smith reiterated that the changes do not include new policies; rather, they include necessary updates and a more logical order.

Attendees did not have questions or comments.

e. Other

Mr. Wiatt reported that the Bureau update s-BASERS to allow sponsors to enter the date an apprentice completes Transition to Trainer and the date an apprentice completes all related instruction. He noted that those processes are currently completed via email.

Action: the Bureau will research whether sponsors should enter T2T completion dates and related instruction completion dates in s-BASERS.

- 6. The state committee reviewed its participant report and stated the data appears accurate. Mr. Smith complimented the state committee on its high percentage of minority apprentices.
- 7. The Bureau will schedule the next meeting via online survey.

WTCS Systemwide Report August 2022

WTCS Apprenticeship Enrollment Trend

WTCS enrollments across all apprenticeship programs increased from 7630 to 7742 unduplicated, and 7720 to 7822 duplicated, students by the end of 2021-2022 academic year. That is a 1.5% and 1.3% increase, respectively, in one year.

Ascendium Education Group Substantially Increases to the Tools of the Trade (ToTT) Scholarship

In April of 2022, <u>Ascendium Education Group announced</u> the awarding of \$766,500 in \$1500 scholarships to over 500 construction and industrial apprentices who received their related instruction through a WTCS college in 2021-22. This unexpected increase more than doubled the total awards over the prior year.

Continuing that expansion trend for the 2022-23 academic year, the ToTT scholarship will increase to \$2000 per person. Ascendium expects to again award over 500 scholarships in Spring 2023. The scholarship application period runs September 1-October 31, 2022. Contact the local Technical College Apprenticeship Offices for more information.

Preparing to Teach Transition to Trainer (PT2TT2T)

In 2021, one-hundred twenty-four (124) private and public sector individuals completed a PT2TT2T or Teaching Methods course to prepare as instructors for the BAS Transition to Trainer course. For 2022-23, additional T2T instructor training courses will open for registration later in fall 2022 with more to be scheduled in 2023 based on demand. 5-Year Cyclical Revision Plan for Apprenticeship Related Instruction offered through the WTCS

Starting in 2021, the WTCS and BAS adopted a 5-year cycle revision framework for all systemwide apprenticeship curriculum where related instruction is offered at more than one WTCS college. Approximately seventy systemwide apprenticeship programs have a documented curriculum standard that forms the foundation for review of program and course outcomes and competencies. Apprenticeship faculty, industry sponsors and State Apprenticeship Trade Advisory Committees are engaged in the review process.
