#### Context: (Purpose, Vision, Mission, Goal):

The purpose of Public Health Emergency Preparedness (PHEP) Advisory Committee is to provide policy, program, and resource allocation recommendations to the State of Wisconsin Public Health Emergency Preparedness Program to assure that Wisconsin is prepared to effectively and efficiently prevent, detect and report, investigate, control, and recover from public health emergencies. The charge to this committee is to make recommendations to the Public Health Council on priorities and strategies to achieve public health emergency preparedness goals in Wisconsin.

The Public Health Council was created by 2003 Wisconsin Act 186 (Wis. Stat. §15.197[13]). By statute, the Council's purpose is to advise the Department of Health Services, the Governor, the Legislature and the public on progress in implementing the state's 10-year public health plan and coordination of responses to public health emergencies.

- Membership for this Committee indicates 5-7 voting members with terms of 2 years. At least 50% of members should also be members of the Public Health Council (criteria met). Membership should cover the following roles: Committee Chair, PHEP Advisory Committee Liaison, State Health Plan Liaison, Equity. Membership may cover the following roles: local level rep from a health department/Tribal health center and/or healthcare/hospitals, and a representative from WALHDAB or the Joint Public Affairs Committee.
- Committee Work
  - The Issues Committee's immediate work will include finalizing the survey scoring tool and using the tool to review all submitted issues via survey and prioritizing them. From there, this Committee will make a recommendation to the Public Health Council on 8/4/23 in relation to a slate of issues for Workgroups (to be developed) to address. The committee is envisioning a series of 6 meetings starting in early April and completing by mid-late July.
- Closing of the Issues Committee survey does not prevent subcommittees like PHEPAC from identifying and raising urgent and emerging issues; there are procedures in place to fast-track issues to Issues Committee as needed

- Emergency Response Coordinator position has been filled by Laura Reinke, formerly the Community Preparedness Coordinator/Business Emergency Operations Center (BEOC) Liaison with Wisconsin Emergency Management
- Laura has also served in roles as a FEMA Program Specialist, in the Peace Corps in Guatemala as a Healthy Schools coordinator, and at UW Hospital as a nursing assistant
- Laura joined OPEHC March 13
- Hospital Preparedness Program Coordinator position filled by Lauri Maki, formerly Emergency Management Director at Brown County, Public Health Educator at Brown County Public Health, a 911 dispatcher/trainer
- Lauri will start on May 8 and will be based out of the Green Bay/Northeastern regional public health office

<ul> <li>PHEP 2023-2024 Funding Application (Sorensen)</li> <li>CDC has finalized the PHEP Budget Period 5 (BP5) funding allocations for all PHEP recipients (Wisconsin DHS is a PHEP "recipient") and extended the application deadline for recipients to April 21.</li> <li>The final BP5 funding includes increased support to PHEP recipients following a \$20 million increase in FY 2023 appropriations for the PHEP program (nationwide). The total funding includes a \$7.1 million increase in Cities Readiness Initiative (CRI) funding and a \$3.6 million increase for the Laboratory Response Network for Chemical Threats (LRN-C) to replace obsolete chemical laboratory testing equipment.</li> <li>Wisconsin receives PHEP Base funding in three major categories: PHEP Base-plus-population, PHEP-Cities Readiness Initiative (supporting jurisdictions in large Metropolitan Statistical Areas), and PHEP Level 1 Chem Lab (WSLH)</li> <li>Wisconsin received slight adjustments to PHEP base-plus-population funding category, Wisconsin received an increase in total PHEP funding compared to the previous year. CDC added direct assistance funds that support salary, travel, and software license costs for Wisconsin's</li> </ul>
<ul> <li>second Career Epidemiology Field Officer (CEFO).</li> <li>CEFOs are CDC epidemiologists with experience in surveillance, epi, preparedness, research, training, and policy development</li> </ul>



<ul> <li>Wisconsin currently has two CEFOs, Ian Pray and Hannah Segaloff, who have worked primarily in BCD but also support OPEHC and other DPH efforts</li> <li>Wisconsin also received a total increase of \$57,799 in PHEP-Cities Readiness Initiative (CRI) BP5 funding, compared to CRI funds received in BP4. 100% of these funds will be allocated to Wisconsin's 18 CRI-funded local health departments in BP5. All CRI jurisdictions can expect to receive an increase in their CRI BP5 funding. This increase results in a \$11,925 increase in total PHEP funding available to Wisconsin compared to last year.</li> <li>LTHDs can continue to expect to receive level PHEP funding in BP5.</li> <li>There was no change to PHEP-Level 1 Lab funding for Wisconsin.</li> <li>See PHEP <u>BP4 Funding Table</u> and <u>BP5 Funding Table</u>. suggestion. Currently, the focus of the MRC program is on re-building.

OPEHC is conducting outreach to answer this question.</li> <li>The group discussed the value of regional teams and regional assets.</li> <li>Brittany Fry indidcated it would be helpful to have a meeting with LTHDs on the state emergency response plan for joint planning efforts</li> <li>It would be beneficial to have a recommendation from WEM to local EMs to keep public health in mind. As we know, not all EM-PH relationships are equal across jurisdictions; it is important that collaboration be modeled at the state level.</li> </ul>

Ready or Not 2023: Protecting the Public's Health from Diseases, Disasters, and Bioterrorism
<ul> <li>Trust for America's Health (TFAH) released its 20<sup>th</sup> annual <i>Ready or Not:</i> <i>Protecting the Public's Health from Diseases, Disasters, and Bioterrorism</i> report on Thursday, March 23, 2023. A copy of the report and the report press release are available <u>on the TFAH website</u>.</li> <li>The report measures states' preparedness to respond to a spectrum of health emergencies and to provide ongoing public health services based on 10 indicators. It furthermore gives federal and state policymakers actionable data and recommended steps to improve the nation's public health readiness.</li> <li>The report tiers states and the District of Columbia into three performance levels – high, middle, and low – placing 19 states and DC in the high-</li> </ul>



		<ul> <li>performance tier, 16 states in the middle performance tier, and 15 states in the low performance tier.</li> <li>Nine states showed notable improvement, moving up a tier: Delaware, Georgia, Maine, Mississippi, North Carolina, and Wisconsin moved from the middle tier to the high tier, compared to last year's report.</li> <li>In addition, the report includes policy recommendations for action by the administration, Congress, and states including: <ul> <li>Increase funding to modernize public health data collection and to grow the size and diversity of the public health workforce</li> <li>Rebuild trust in public health and protect and strengthen public health authorities</li> <li>Invest in public health communications and counter misinformation</li> <li>Ensure paid leave for all employees</li> <li>Support the medical countermeasures pipeline</li> <li>Prepare for extreme weather and environmental threats</li> </ul> </li> </ul>
