

I am writing to you to request that Phase 1b prioritize those of us educators that are currently face to face with students. I am a school psychologist on the Milwaukee Public Schools initial special education evaluation team. The Department of Instruction is requiring that students continue to be evaluated for special education needs, even though MPS has been virtual this school year. My team and I conduct face to face evaluation of students ages 2-21. School psychologists conducting these evaluations must break social distancing guidelines and often are unable to have young or moderately disabled children wear masks in rooms with little to no ventilation. Testing sessions typically take 60-90 minutes. We also must use a series of manipulatives, demonstrating puzzles and use of other materials to students with intellectual, physical, sensory, and social-emotional disabilities. Testing sessions occur up to 4 times per day. I am asking that school psychologists (clinicians similar to school speech pathologists and occupational/physical therapists) be a priority in Phase 1b, along with EMTs, Fire-fighters, and Police. We understand that educators are in this phase of vaccination, but urge you to consider- at the very least, our evaluation team psychologists (n=40), as they see more evaluations per day than psychologists in any other district. Milwaukee is a hot spot for the virus. Please assist us in keeping our families and students with special needs safe. Psychologists were the only school-based clinician excluded from Phase 1a.

Dear Vaccine Distribution Subcommittee,

I am writing to have school psychologists in MPS, particularly the approximately 25 of us on the Special Education (IEP) Evaluation Team, be a priority in Phase 1B, along with EMTs, Fire-fighters, and Police. School psychologists on the IEP Evaluation Team are among the extremely small percentage of staff who have been mandated to work with MPS students in-person on a daily basis since August. We evaluate for a range of disabilities, having to use tests that break social distancing guidelines. Oftentimes these evaluations are with children who may not be mask compliant or are transitioning from the Birth to 3 program and are too young for a mask. We often meet with multiple families in a single day, some of us in poorly ventilated rooms.

Milwaukee has always been a COVID-19 hot spot in the state and because of that, MPS has been closed to all in-person instruction. However, since the 20-21 school year began, the Department of Public Instruction (DPI) has not granted any leeway on evaluations for Special Education, so the IEP Evaluation Team members have been the only ones to meet with students in-person for an extended period of time to complete the necessary testing.

Our speech pathologists and OT/PT colleagues who evaluate these same students, have been provided with the opportunity to get the vaccine in Phase 1A. However, we were not and remain the only school based clinician excluded from Phase 1A. Families get these same types of evaluations in the community from psychologists in medical facilities that have already been granted the vaccine.

By virtue of the fact that DPI has said these evaluations from school based clinicians must carry on in-person separates us from other educators in which the state has made no mandates that teachers go in-person. MPS deemed in-person learning to dangerous for educators and students, yet we still have to do our role in-person. Please help keep the MPS school psychologists and all the families we work with safe and make us priority in Phase 1B.

I am writing as a school psychologist at Milwaukee Public Schools, the largest school district in the state. While MPS has been virtual this school year, we continue to conduct in person evaluations with students in every building. MPS has a centralized initial evaluation team, with approximately 50 evaluators (psychologists and speech pathologists), who have been conducting face to face evaluation of students ages 3-21 since August 2020. School psychologists must break social distancing guidelines and often are unable to have young or moderately disabled children wear masks. We also must use a series of manipulatives, demonstrating puzzles and use of other materials to students with intellectual, physical, sensory, and social-emotional disabilities. Psychologists assigned to the evaluation team test daily, multiple students per day. MPS currently has approximately 160 school psychologists. We are asking that school psychologists (clinicians similar to school speech pathologists and occupational/physical therapists) be a priority in Phase 1b, along with EMTs, Fire-fighters, and Police. Please understand that in the school system we function similarly as the state defined "health professionals." In fact, since August, school psychologists evaluate more students and spend more time completing in-person tasks than school nurses, occupational therapists, physical therapists, and children's health assistants, who have been defined as 1a. I urge the committee to consider the logistics of the school system when prioritizing vaccines for group 1b. Milwaukee is a hot spot for the virus. Please assist us in keeping our families and students with special needs safe. Psychologists were the only school-based clinician excluded from Phase 1a.

I am taking this opportunity to recommend that favorable consideration be made to set the minimum age limit at 65 rather than at 75.


My rationale for this consideration is that restricting the availability of the vaccine to only 75 and older misses the more significant group of elderly who are retired and more active in society which thereby makes them more susceptible to exposure of the virus; as well as being the larger grouping of the elderly that are more prone to major surgeries and procedures.

Since the first wave of vaccines included institutionalized elderly, you have already significantly addressed those 75 and older. Consideration must now be given to people like my wife and I who are each months yet from 75. She has undergone 2 surgeries and months-long physical therapy sessions in 2019-20. I'm scheduled for a hip replacement in 3 weeks for which my surgeon strongly recommends I do my best to get a vaccination prior to that surgery. We, as an example, are considered relatively healthy and active for our age yet we spend, on average, one day a week with some sort of medical appointment. 

A *huge* amount of health care dollars are invested in an organ transplant – not to be rude with a focus on cost, BUT after a huge spend of both public and private funds on a successful transplant, it would be rather foolish to ignore this specific subset of the population. While the logistics of identifying organ transplant recipients on a population-based platform would be nearly impossible, I believe it could be accomplished by working with major health care systems who routinely follow these patients even years after transplant.

Regarding age and disability threshold for vaccination, picking a hard age risk proxy as the primary discriminator is less appropriate effective than Medical conditions, as a person age 69 suffering cardiovascular disease, is at much higher danage3r to fatality than a healthy 70 year old. I would propose that anyone above age 65 suffering a medical condition be granted an equal, if not higher status than a person 70 in good health. These medical condition candidates should not be relegated to secondary status to be vaccinated only if excess vaccine is available.

In terms of education sector, I support that only those in DIRECT contact with the subjects be granted priority vaccination. This would preclude administrative staff at schools. This applies through higher education levels. Those in the direct line of teaching or contact with students deserve priority over those who do not.

Conversely, people whose jobs require them to work at a fixed station, whether at a machine or a research station or similar, should receive priority as they do not have an alternative workplace option, and must accept whatever risk may be inherent with that station.



I am writing as the President of Psychologists Association of the Milwaukee Public Schools, the largest school district in the state. While MPS has been virtual this school year, we continue to conduct in person evaluations with students in every building. MPS has a centralized initial evaluation team, with approximately 50 evaluators (psychologists and speech pathologists), who have been conducting face to face evaluation of students ages 3-21 since August 2020. School psychologists must break social distancing guidelines and often are unable to have young or moderately disabled children wear masks. We also must use a series of manipulatives, demonstrating puzzles and use of other materials to students with intellectual, physical, sensory, and social-emotional disabilities. Psychologists assigned to the evaluation team test daily, multiple students per day. MPS currently has approximately 160 school psychologists. We are asking that school psychologists (clinicians similar to school speech pathologists and occupational/physical therapists) be a priority in Phase 1b, along with EMTs, Fire-fighters, and Police. We understand that educators are in this phase of vaccination, but urge you to consider- at the very least, our evaluation team psychologists and bilingual psychologists (n=40), as they see more evaluations per day than psychologists in any other district. Milwaukee is a hot spot for the virus. Please assist us in keeping our families and students with special needs safe. Psychologists were the only school-based clinician excluded from Phase 1a. 



All inmates should receive vaccinations during phase 1b. Without question. Anyone who has been placed at a mental health institution or treatment center, inmate or otherwise, should also be vaccinated. It would be cruel and inhumane not to help these populations. This is a human rights issue, not a partisan issue.

Everyone who has an auto-immune condition, everyone who takes immunosuppressant or immunomodulating meds, and everyone with health conditions that put them at high risk for complications for the virus, regardless of age, should absolutely be included in phase 1b.

I take an immunomodulating medicine and I live with someone who has an immune condition and a lung disease. I currently have a painful infected broken tooth that the dentist wants me to get repaired immediately. To do this I have to have to be unmasked, mouth open, in a dentist's office for over an hour, breathing in the air. The dentists are not in full PPE. Other patients will have been in the room before me, unmasked. People like us who are high risk for complications shouldn't have to risk death whenever we or someone in our home receives necessary medical care. And we need more frequent medical care than the general population.

Another important reason to vaccinate people with compromised immune systems is that we are highly susceptible to infections, and, for example, have to avoid not only people who have chicken pox/shingles, but also people who have just been vaccinated for chicken pox or shingles, because they may be shedding the virus. This holds true with the coronavirus vaccine. CDC is advising that people who receive the vaccine may be carriers, and from what I understand this is especially true right after they receive the vaccine. So when someone with a suppressed or modulated immune system comes into close contact with someone who was vaccinated, they can contract the virus from that person more easily than the general public could.

Many high-risk people with major health conditions are front line workers whose jobs require them to leave the home, and they are unable to pay their bills if they don't work. It is unfair to deny them immunizations just because they are under age 65.

I also feel that people who are scheduled for surgeries or invasive medical procedures such as colonoscopies, dental work, transvaginal ultrasounds, etc, ought to be vaccinated prior to their appointments. Obviously in emergency situations that may not be feasible, but for pre-planned procedures, it just makes sense.

To Whom it May Concern,

As you consider who to include in the 1B phase for vaccines and how to prioritize those within it, I ask that you please place teachers as one of the top groups on the priority list. I understand there are MANY "essential workers" and groups at risk who deserve/need the vaccine and the number of vaccines are limited, so difficult choices must be made. But we need to protect our teachers as soon as possible so ALL students can get back in the classroom and teachers can feel more comfortable and safer being in their classroom. Teachers getting priority in group 1B for the vaccine will accomplish that goal and that is why I am writing to you today.

After police and firefighters, teachers should be considered the next group in 1B to have access, even before some of the other groups proposed in 1B. I understand the living situation of prisoners puts them at greater risk, but limiting vaccines to only prison staff and personnel and allowing no visitors until the vaccine becomes more widely available, will greatly minimize their risk and allow others to receive the vaccine, especially teachers who have a greater risk because they have prolonged contact with others every day for their job and physical distancing may not always be possible.

Appendix E outlines the rationale for including education essential workers in Group 1B and I completely agree with everything stated and believe giving them priority in 1B is highly justified. I appreciate the thoughtfulness, great attention to detail and research done by the committee.

Although alternative teaching methods may be available, "virtual only" schooling is simply not a long-term viable option and that is all that many students have been receiving for nearly an entire year. Every day I witness firsthand the social, mental, emotional and physical toll this is taking on my children. The benefits of having children in school not only positively impacts students but the community as well. This is exactly what so many of us parents, especially those in high school, have been relaying to school administrators as to why students need to be back in the classroom. We must focus all of our efforts on making this happen instead of continually finding reasons to keep them out of the classroom.

But this isn't only about the students. It is about the teachers too. They also need and want to be back in the classroom with their students. But they have concerns for their safety and those concerns are justified and should be addressed. Teachers currently in person are concerned for their safety and some feel forced to be there and fear for their health. Teachers in larger districts are very reluctant to return to the classroom due to safety concerns, so larger districts remain virtual only. The bottom line is, ALL teachers are concerned for their health and safety so we must make the vaccine available to them as soon as possible. Schools have thoroughly

developed safety protocols and mitigation strategies to minimize the risk as much as possible. But for many teachers, they still feel it is not enough. No one wants teachers to live in fear for their health and safety. That would not be good for students either and would prevent teachers from performing their best. We want teachers to feel some level of comfort being back in the classroom. And the vaccine would provide greater comfort AND keep them safe.

Although many schools throughout WI have reopened for younger grades, they are only now beginning to bring the upper grades back in person. And most are doing a hybrid, part-time model. And unfortunately, larger school districts, like Madison, Milwaukee and Racine (which combined make up at least 20% of all WI students), are continuing to remain "virtual only" for the 3rd quarter and likely the rest of the school year, if teachers are not vaccinated soon. So at least 50% of the 800,000 WI students are likely not receiving in-person instruction at all or are only in person part-time. The current education model is just not working and not a viable long-term option.

With many students being out of the classroom for nearly a year already, the negative impact this continues to have on them is extremely tragic. As the committee stated, our children are suffering. And every day they continue to be out of the classroom, their mental, emotional and physical health is more at risk. Students are unmotivated and disengaged. Mental health referrals have greatly increased. Depression, anxiety and more are growing concerns. Not to mention the physical health problems pediatricians are seeing with an increase in type 2 diabetes in children due to lack of activity.

Larger districts simply won't reopen without teachers being vaccinated despite many schools having reopened successfully and health experts supporting schools reopening. In Dane County where I live, case numbers, positivity rate and hospitalizations have continued to decline. Many area schools plan to return to in-person instruction for 3rd quarter or bring back additional grades. However, the Madison School District (MMSD), which has 26,000 students, is still facing huge resistance from teachers. My son is an 11th grader in MMSD and many parents of high school students are extremely concerned about the lack of education our children are receiving being virtual only. (In our virtual school model in Madison, high school students receive LESS THAN HALF the instruction time they would receive in a normal school year.) And the longer this continues, I fear the worse it will get. Our high school children do not have years of school left to "make up" for all of this lost instruction time. High school years are critical and students need to prepare for college, take the ACT, participate in extra-curricular activities to include on college applications and more. It is just not possible for high schoolers to be prepared for college with virtual schooling. Besides lack of instruction time, students are missing out on all of the social, emotional and mental development that comes along with being in school. Parents will always have a choice to remain virtual, but those of us who feel our children need in-person instruction, we feel we should also have a choice. And we simply won't get that choice until teachers are vaccinated.

One of the key components will also be mass vaccinations given to entire school districts at the same time. For example, the Madison Metropolitan School District has 4000 teachers/staff. It would be a huge challenge for schools to reopen if teachers in the district are randomly selected each week. It would take weeks, possibly months, before everyone would be vaccinated. When teachers become eligible for the vaccine, there needs to be a mass vaccination plan for larger counties and districts, similar to what Mercy Hospital has planned for the Janesville School District later this week.

So as you consider who receives the next phase of vaccines, PLEASE consider prioritizing teachers in group 1B so our children can get back into the classroom. Several states have already started vaccinating teachers. And President-elect Joe Biden has made it a mission of his administration to get all kids back in the classroom within his first 100 days. Let's have Wisconsin do our part to make this happen.

Dear Co-Chairs:

We are writing as organizations who support and advocate for the more than 75,000 people with disabilities and older adults who are eligible for the Medicaid long-term waiver under home and community-based services (HCBS) through Family Care, Family Care Partnership, PACE, and IRIS programs. The undersigned organizations deeply appreciate and strongly support the subcommittee's inclusion of Family Care and IRIS recipients as a separate priority group in the phase 1b vaccine group and urge the Department of Health Services to designate **all Family Care and IRIS members as a 1b priority group.**

A proportion of the people with disabilities served within these programs would have already been eligible for vaccine under group 1a due to their residential environment; however, a significant yet critical group has been left out: those participants who live in smaller congregate living settings and those who live in their own homes or supported apartments. This population includes people with a range of disabilities and chronic health conditions who are eligible based on their need for a nursing home level of care, much as frail elders in the program are eligible.

In Wisconsin, the death rate for people with disabilities accessing Wisconsin's long-term care system is higher than the general population of Wisconsin. As of 1/5/2021, the Department of Health Services reported 10.7 % death rate of members in long-term care contracting the virus compared to a 1% death rate for all people

1

contracting the virus in Wisconsin.

Recent data indicates that people with intellectual and developmental disabilities (IDD) are at higher risk for acquiring the coronavirus and early data also suggests a higher risk of death and increased disability due to the virus. A recent FAIR Health white paper which analyzed a massive number of insurance claims documented

that across all age groups, people with intellectual disabilities have the third highest risk of COVID-19 death. The data also demonstrated that people with IDD have a greater mortality risk than people with heart failure and chronic lung disease. The paper highlights the death rate among all patients with COVID-19 was 0.6%. But, for people with developmental disorders it was 1.22% and 3.37% of those with intellectual disabilities.

In addition to these statistics, there are multiple risk factors for people with disabilities in the long-term care system that should be considered in your decision-making process.

1. People in long-term care disproportionately live at congregate settings. Congregate settings include licensed and unlicensed homes in Wisconsin. This would include assisted living, 1-2/bed or 3-4 bed adult family homes, and community based residential facilities (CBRF). People in these setting are often unable

to make decisions regarding who and how many outside people provide supports and services, often in intimate proximity that does not allow for physical distancing, putting them at higher risk of exposure. Individuals who live in group homes or other congregate residential settings should be considered at equivalent risk to older adults who live in congregate settings. Many settings that are not formally licensed through the state Division of Quality Assurance, but which are still congregate in nature have not been notified they are eligible for vaccination schedule and many verified 1a congregate settings have yet to be vaccinated. This comment also supports the subcommittee's recommendation that residents of smaller licensed or certified congregate settings be prioritized in phase 1b regardless of their participation in either Family Care or IRIS.

- 2. People in long-term care disproportionately attend daily services in congregate settings, including adult day care, day service centers, and sheltered workshops. They also use congregate transportation, such as buses, to get to those settings. These settings bring together people with disabilities and care providers from many different households, increasing the risk of contracting the virus. While many have policies in place to mitigate risk, it is often impossible to eliminate all risk.
- 3. People in long-term care who live in their own homes or supported apartments are still at great risk of contracting COVID-19. The nature of their support needs is such that most of these people have multiple caregivers providing hands on care to them. Although technically covered under phase 1a, most of these workers are not connected to any health care system and do not have ready access to the vaccine. Thus, even though nearly 30% of health care workers have been vaccinated, almost none of those are in the care force that supports the IRIS and Family Care population living in non-congregate settings. Vaccination under phase 1a that was supposed to protect this vulnerable population (by protecting its care force), has not been implemented at this time leaving both the caregiver and the person they serve vulnerable.
- 4. People in long-term care receive personal and supportive care services from paid and unpaid caregivers that put them at higher risk due to close contact during these supports. Paid caregivers may also be working with multiple individuals at multiple locations, increasing the risk of spreading the virus between individuals.
- 5. People in long-term care are often supported at home by elderly parent caregivers who are also at high risk of contracting the virus. Elderly caregivers may be at higher risk of contracting the virus and death resulting in the person with the disability at risk of being placed in a nursing care facility due to lack of support.
- 6. Some people in long-term care often have limited ability to follow the recommendations of the CDC to reduce the potential for contracting and spreading the virus, including mask wearing, adequate handwashing, and physical distancing. Sensory issues, receptive and expressive language disorders, inability to assess safety risks are all typical symptoms of intellectual disabilities that make it far more likely that this population will be unable to comply with basic preventative protocols. The largest national survey of Direct Support Professionals (completed by the University of MN and the National Alliance for Direct Support Professionals 9,000 DSP's) indicates that approximately 40% of the people supported by

DSPs have either only fair or poor social distancing practices.

- 7. People in long-term care are experiencing extreme social isolation. Many people with disabilities living in congregate settings or sheltering at home have not been allowed to leave their homes, visit with family and friends, or continue their employment. Many do not have access to phones or other technology to remain virtually connected to family and friends. For many people, this has led to increased mental health concerns, escalated behavioral challenges and the need for additional supports and services in their residential settings. For people in this group this is more than just the typical lack of social contact a person without intellectual disability is experiencing during this ordeal. Social and community integration experiences are typically written into IRIS and Family Care care plans. For this group, being able to experience the larger world is treatment-not recreation or entertainment.
- 8. People in the long-term care system are eligible for a nursing home level of care but have been able to live in the community with supports and services. To quality for Wisconsin's long-term care waiver

services, an individual must be found eligible to need a nursing home level of care. This group of Wisconsinites would have fallen into 1a if they were not being cared for in the community under the home and community-based waivers.

In addition to the risk factors listed above, people in long-term care are easily identified for vaccine delivery. The Department of Health Services already has access to their location, health conditions, and the service systems that deliver their care. These members and participants have monthly contact with a care manager or IRIS consultant who can help them gain information on how to receive a vaccination, where to receive the vaccine, and facilitate reminders when the second dose needs to be administered.

We would respectfully ask that you include the entire population in the Medicaid long-term waiver under home and community-based services (HCBS) through Family Care, Family Care Partnership, PACE, and IRIS in the 1b priority group.

Dear Committee Members...

Priority consideration should be given to those who are most likely to require hospitalization or have serious consequences from the disease. I have not heard of a category given to those of us that are elderly **with** preexisting conditions. Personally, I am over 65 and have COPD, which I have been told puts me in a significantly higher risk category. It is unfair people with less risk of serious complications be prioritized ahead, although I do agree that EMS and medical personnel should be the top priority.

A rating system might help establish fair priority. I am surprised that this isn't being done. Those over 65 might get 2 points, those over 75 3 points, those over 85 4 points, those with a blood type predisposed to serious side effects may get another point, those with lung conditions another 2 points, diabetes 2 points, etc.

We've been dealing with the disease long enough to know that masking, gloves and sanitizing can be sufficient for many front-line workers such as clerks and garbage handlers. While everyone feels it is important that they be vaccinated ASAP, those at the highest risk of serious complications should be prioritized.



Hello, thank you for the opportunity to express my opinion regarding phase 1b. I believe without a doubt that people aged 70+ should definitely be included in phase 1b Covid vaccine distribution. People in this age group are at high risk for contracting the virus. The mortality rate for people 70+ is extremely high-71%. That is **extremely high**. The following pubic comments are being submitted by The Wisconsin Developmental Disabilities Network Incorporated to the Wisconsin State Disaster Medical Advisory Committee (SDMAC) on their Recommendations for the Wisconsin Department of Health Services Vaccine Priority Group 1b.

As a statewide organization that works with both children and adult long term support funders, providers and recipients, we appreciate the opportunity to comment on the Tier 1B COVID vaccination priorities.

Our organization believes it's critically important to prioritize all citizens receiving Medicaid funded long term support services whether those services are paid through a managed care organizations, county government or the Medicaid IRIS Waiver program. We believe this is a critical need in the next round of vaccinations.

As described in your summary, this subset of Wisconsin citizens, due to age or permanent disability, have multiple risks due to their own comorbidities. Additionally, in many cases, risks associated with race, poverty and impairment requires shared living situations and a significant reliance on direct care staff who come and go from their home, and the homes of others.

The committee must take into account that not all of these participants live in institutions and substitute care facilities such as nursing homes, assisted living, group homes or foster homes. A significant number of these citizens who experience the impacts of aging or disabilities, live in their own home and home communities throughout our State.

To cost effectively and efficiently get the doses of vaccine to these citizens it will take thoughtful planning and coordination with their individual service provider or support agencies who may employ the direct support staff and who come to their homes to help them with getting out of bed, providing them with personal support for bathing, dressing, eating, medication administration, getting to work or doctor appointments etc.

We would anticipate that a comprehensive plan would allow and encourage the primary care clinics to vaccinate with verification that 'patients' are participants in the state's long term

care programs. We would also anticipate that many citizens who receive Medicaid funded services in their own homes, not facilities, may be vaccinated via county public health drive up clinics as well as other venues in each county.

Managed Care Organizations as well as providers of either managed care or IRS funded long term care can and will get people there but their clearly needs notice of the plan and coordination.

The cost to providers in time and resources to be able to access vaccinations for the individuals served is not minimal and must be considered as a reimbursable cost by DHS and funding organizations. This is not a simple task and providers who have been diligently supporting citizens throughout this pandemic must be valued. Those agencies who are ensuring the health and safety of frail elders or citizens with permanent disabilities need fair compensation for the additional coordination and other costs involved in getting people to the vaccine sites.

It is critical that the state provide, as soon as possible, the **consent form for guardians** to sign along with any vaccine information sheets. To explain this authorization to a legal representative or guardian is a process and will take time . It's highly likely that providers may need to collaborate and provide additional information to frail elders or people with disabilities, their POAs or legal guardians , if any, in order to help them have their concerns addressed. The providers who support these citizens who either live in their own homes, with their family or in licensed or certify facilities need to be contacted soon so they have a reasonable time to review, get their concerns addressed and hopefully sign with consent. Having this official consent form and the vaccine information facts sheets will not only give providers more assistance but it will give citizens who are making the consent decision greater confidence in the efficacy of the vaccine.

Our organization has been hearing about COVID positive rates that are well over 10% for people supported in their own homes and for their staff. Many community providers have had weeks in which more than 20% -25% of staff were under quarantine and unable to work, creating an even more significant staffing crisis situation. In one agency, all but one COVID positive situation for individuals served was attributable to contact with a staff person who was positive, but not yet aware of their infection. About 50% of the COVID positive staff were infected via work contact. All of this occurred with very good protocols in place with PPE, sanitization, etc., but without access to the PPE used in hospital settings such as fit-tested N95 masks, or personal battery powered respirators, as they were not able to access those supplies.

Including frail elders and citizens with disabilities who live in their own apartments or homes need to be included in this 1b category. People shouldn't have to reside in a nursing home or other residential facility to be viewed as a priority. These citizens who receive Medicaid funded long term care from the IRIS Waiver or Family Care should be included. Please let me know if you have any questions or concerns.

State Disaster Medical Advisory Committee (SDMAC):

I am extremely dismayed to see that the committee is recommending the vaccination of the large number of educators in our state in group 1b. Not only is this completely illogical at this point in the school year but it will, in many cases, prioritize the healthy over our most vulnerable.

Let's assume you start vaccinating teachers on February 1. Let's also assume that you could vaccinate all teachers by the end of February. That would mean that the second doses would begin in March and be completed by the end of the month. Add 2 weeks (at least) for all teachers to reach full immunity. We are now at mid-April. Are we really going to use these doses so that schools could be open to in-person learning for perhaps 6 weeks before letting out for the summer? How does that make sense? Are YOU going to tell the 65-year old with a heart condition he won't get the vaccine now because we are going to give that dose to a 25-year old healthy kindergarten teacher?

Once our first responders and health care workers are vaccinated, we should be prioritizing those that are more likely to become very ill or die when they contract the virus. 

Dear Vaccine Subcommittee Members:

Thank you for all of your efforts to move the COVID vaccination process forward in Wisconsin.

I am a physician in Madison

I am writing to ask for the following to be considered

in vaccine distribution:

1. Thank you for including IRIS and Family Care participants in Phase 1b. Please consider also including participants of the Children's Long Term Support Waiver (CLTS). This would allow inclusion of those 16- and 17-year-olds with significant disability who are still covered under the CLTS and who could receive the Pfizer vaccine in Phase 1b. As approvals for younger age groups arrive, this will ensure children with intellectual and developmental disability who are at higher risk of poor COVID-19 outcomes are prioritized. The reasoning for including this group is nearly identical to that outlined for IRIS/Family Care and is likely a relatively small number.

2. Several states (California's statement pasted below) have explicitly defined family members of individuals with intellectual and/or developmental disability as "health care workers" for the purposes of vaccine distribution and are therefore eligible to receive vaccine under Phase 1a. While in-home care workers are currently identified as Phase 1a, our family, like many others, have halted use of these during the pandemic in order to protect our son from exposure. Therefore, the pandemic has shifted the caregiving load onto families as we now provide all of the care that was previously provided by outside caregivers. Ryan is unable to wear a mask, too young to receive vaccine, and requires full assistance for all activities of daily living. It would be nearly certain he would become infected if either his father or I were infected. While I am eligible based on my occupation, my husband and many other similar family caregivers are not. Please consider either clarifying that family members providing paid or unpaid care to those who receive CLTS/IRIS/Family Care are "healthcare workers" and therefore eligible in Phase 1a OR please consider explicitly adding this group in 1b.

The above changes would be very impactful

To Whom It May Concern:

California has a large population of people with intellectual and/or developmental disabilities. Recent COVID-19 studies have identified several groups within this population as being at high risk of COVID-19 complications and related fatalities. The purpose of this letter is to clarify that family members of certain people are "health care workers" pursuant to the State of California's <u>Vaccination Plan (https://covid19.ca.gov/vaccines/#When-can-l-get-vaccinated</u>), and thus are prioritized for COVID-19 vaccination within Phase 1A.

These family members include those who care for people with any of the following conditions. This list is not necessarily exhaustive:

- Cerebral palsy
- Down Syndrome
- Epilepsy
- Specialized health care needs, including dependence upon ventilators, oxygen, and other technology

The eligibility of these family members can be ascertained by documentation from their California regional center, verifying the qualifying condition of the member of their household who has an intellectual or developmental disability. A list of regional centers is available here: https://www.dds.ca.gov/rc/listings/. Alternatively, a family member may choose to present medical documentation of the qualifying condition of the member of their household who has an intellectual or developmental disability.

We hope this letter clarifies the eligibility of certain family members for the COVID-19 vaccine pursuant to Phase 1A of the State's Plan, and thereby assists in protecting the health of Californians most at risk from COVID-19 impacts.

I hope this message finds you and your family safe, healthy and well.

My name is T.R. Williams and I serve as the Deputy Director of External Affairs in the Office of Governor Evers.

I am emailing to confirm that our office successfully received your email and letter on behalf of the American Diabetes Association. I have attached your letter to this email, for reference.

We understand the request for the prioritization of individuals with diabetes in the COVID-19 vaccine distribution and your request that the State does not differentiate between Type 1 and Type 2 diabetes in the distribution prioritization.

Your concerns are important. I have shared your message and the information included in your message with the appropriate people on our team, including directly with the State Disaster Medical Advisory Committee (SDMAC).

The distribution of the vaccine is currently in phase 1a with the Wisconsin Department of Health Services (DHS) focusing on frontline healthcare personnel and residents of long term care facilities. Beginning the week of January 18, 2021 DHS expects to begin vaccinations for EMT personnel, Fire personnel and older adults.

DHS is still receiving guidance and recommendations on matters of vaccine prioritization. DHS will be relying on guidance from the Advisory Committee of Immunization Practices (ACIP) and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC).

In addition, the <u>State Disaster Medical Advisory Committee (SDMAC</u>) is actively working on <u>recommendations</u> to the DHS Secretary and the Governor on vaccine allocation for Wisconsin. All of the meetings of the SDMAC are open to the public, and posted on the <u>public meetings</u> <u>website</u> as well as on the <u>DHS website</u>.

The SDMAC Vaccine Distribution Subcommittee has advanced their recommendations for COVID-19 Vaccine Priority Group 1b. You can review the document <u>here</u>, and submit comment to <u>DHSSDMAC@dhs.wisconsin.gov</u>.

Dear Governor Evers:

I write to bring to your immediate attention important new clinical evidence that makes it clear that many individuals with type 1 diabetes mellitus (T1D) are at equal risk to those with type 2 diabetes mellitus (T2D) for greater morbidity and mortality from COVID-19. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) currently categorizes people with T2D as being at increased risk while indicating people with T1D "may be" at increased risk. States are utilizing the CDC risk classification when designing their vaccine distribution plans. This raises an obvious concern as it could result in the approximately 1.6 million with T1D receiving the vaccination later than others with the same risk.

Although early data did not provide as much clarity about the extent to which those with T1D are at high risk, newer data has emerged that convincingly demonstrates that COVID-19 severity is more than tripled in individuals with T1D¹. Those with T1D have a 3.3 fold greater risk of severe illness, are 3.9 times more likely to be hospitalized with COVID-19, and have a three-fold increase in mortality compared to those without T1D.² These risks are comparable to the increased risk established for those with T2D³.

The new science leaves little doubt that there should be no distinction between individuals with Type 1 and Type 2 diabetes mellitus, given the common, heightened risk both groups face for the most severe health outcomes of COVID-19. Considering this information, the American



As you make difficult decisions about those who should be included in the 1B category for receipt of the COVID vaccination, I encourage you to consider those with Trisomy 21 or Down Syndrome.

Recent articles published in SCIENCE and in the ANNALS OF INTERNAL MEDICINE cite the 10 fold increase in death and 5 fold increase in hospitalization for those with Trisomy 21. This increase is noted when other medical issues are controlled for. It is felt to be related over expression (3 copies of the gene) of a protein that codes for an enzyme that cleaves the spike protein on the coronoavirus allowing the virus to enter the host cell. This makes those individuals with Down Syndrome genetically more susceptible to COVID 19.

As a physician who cares for many young adults with Down Syndrome, I can testify to all that they bring to our community and world. They truly make this world a better, more compassionate place.
