#### Playground Falls Highlights

### American Family Children's Hospital

- Program description: Soft Surface Education to Town Park Board Members
- Key partners: Park boards and local community families and leaders
- One time education on the importance of soft surfaces in parks.

### American Family Children's Hospital

- Key Takeaway: Town boards have funding for soft surfaces and some board members were unaware that parks in their town/village did not have soft surfaces.
- Key Takeaway: Working with families that play at the park was valuable.
- Barriers: Getting on the agenda

- Background: Falls are a top injury, especially in the 5-9 age category.
- Conducted surveys with schools, daycares, park and rec to determine;
  - If policies were in place for their playgrounds.
  - Frequency of inspection of equipment.
  - If there was any training received by staff.
  - If signage was posted at the playground.
  - If tracking of injuries on playgrounds occur.
  - What gaps/needs exist from their perspective.

- Conducted surveys with medical providers on;
  - What they were seeing for injuries.
  - What types of equipment.
  - Theories on reason for injury.
- Data Review: CDC data showed school playgrounds during school months was the biggest group of playground fall injuries.

- Program description: Playground Safety Inspector Course by the National Park and Recreation Association was used as a guide.
  - PowerPoint based recorded training
  - Additional resources including playground tracking tool, playground policy, and outdoor public playground safety handbook
  - SafeKids WI webpage under coalition tools
- Priority population: Schools and daycares

- Barriers: Schools often see money being a barrier to safe playgrounds
- Takeaway: Simple things like volunteer playground supervisors or dedicated supervisors to areas of highest injury related equipment can be effective ways to reduce playground related falls
